SCORES ARE INJURED AS **HURRICANE HITS MIAMI**

Miami, Fla., Nov. 4.-Reported to have taken the lives of three persons, the second disastrous hurricane of the year lashed Miami, swung through the Everglades and tonight passed into the Gulf of Mexico.

The Jacksonville weather burean said the storm moved into the gulf at 8 p. m. (e.s.t.), slightly north of Cape Sable, about thirty miles south of Everglades

The storm's track was some sixty miles north of Key West and all danger was believed gone for the lower keys area.

At Everglades City, the barometer was 29.63 at \$ p. m., and rising while winds were subsid-

Miami at the same hour, had a 24-mile-an-hour wind. May Regain Strength

Gordon E. Dunn, meteorologist, said the hurricane might regain the strength it lost moving across the southern end of the peninsula in the gulf. Passing over water again. Dunn said the storm likely would turn northwestward. Everglades City apparently had

escaped without damage. Signal rockets were sent up tonight by an unidentified ship off Miami Beach about threequarters of a mile. The boat was almost immediately opposite the fashionable Roney Plaza Hotel. Persons at the hotel said the craft appeared to be a combined freighter and passenger steamer


