

# TODAY AND TOMORROW

PEACE . . . . . emotions  
It amuses me to read, as I often do, newspaper reports headed "Peace Meeting Breaks up in a Row." The trouble with all efforts to stop war by conversation is that people bring their personal and racial dislikes and prejudices into these gabfests.  
I don't believe peace is ever going to be insured by talking about it. All of the peace arguments are based on reason and logic. Reason and logic play a very small part in human affairs. Mankind is still the plaything of its emotions. Let the hands start playing and put the boys into khaki, and we'll all throw reason and logic overboard.  
Just the way the folks do who get into a scrap at peace meetings!

WAR . . . . . not people's  
Thinking back over what I have read in the history books, and what I have observed in a fairly long lifetime, I don't remember any war that was actually instigated by the people of any nation. Few ordinary people ever want to go to war with their neighbors. They are led into wars by governments and rulers who have ambitions and purposes which are seldom fully disclosed to the general run of common folk.

I am talking, of course, of the way wars start. Everybody, practically, is ready to jump to the defense of his country when the other fellow starts to invade it.

How to end war? I don't know—and I don't think anyone else does. A good way might be for nations to stop trying to take advantage of each other.

MORALS . . . . . of nations  
One of the commonest examples of loose thinking is the prevalent idea of "national honor." It implies that there is some sort of a moral law or obligation applying to nations, comparable with the moral laws by which individuals are, on the whole, guided in their relations with each other.

There ought to be some such rule or moral law governing international relations, but there isn't. The League of Nations was set up with the idea that it could serve as an international conscience, and by solemn proclamation "outlaw" nations which started to grab something that belonged to other nations. But I doubt very much whether all the moral force and "sanctions" recently brought to bear by the League against Italy would have had any effect if the British fleet had not been mobilized in the Mediterranean.

Conscience has as much to do as policemen in keeping most individuals from taking somebody else's property by force. But until we have an international police force, strong enough to overawe any nation, however powerful, I don't think we're going to stop war.

AMERICA . . . . . free  
Did you ever stop to think that the United States of America is the largest area in the civilized world in which all the people speak the same language? It is more than that. It is the largest area in the world in which everybody can travel freely without interference, sell his goods freely without tariff obstacles, and live and work wherever it pleases him.

War between any two states or any two sections of the United States is unthinkable. We had a sectional war 75 years ago over the question of slavery. That war

# New Corn-Hog Plan Is Made

Control Program Is Announced by Secretary Wallace

Washington, Nov. 4.—Secretary Wallace formally proclaimed a new corn-hog control program today in which adjustment contracts covering a two-year period will be offered.

His announcement came as more than 30 farm representatives studied details of the new contracts, and as the department's annual outlook report forecast a continued upward trend in farm income for next year.

"The demand for farm products in 1936," said the report, "is likely to be greater than in 1935. Consumer buying power in the United States is likely to be increased in 1936; buying power of consumers in many foreign countries also is likely to increase."

Total cash income from farm marketings and AAA benefit payments for 1935 was estimated at \$6,800,000,000, a six per cent increase over 1934's \$6,387,000,000, and 50 per cent above 1932's depression low of \$4,328,000,000.

But the department said the total forecast for this year represents but 67 per cent of the average annual income for the five years preceding 1930. Much of the 1935 improvement was attributed to a marked advance in livestock prices.

Farm administration officials said the new two-year corn-hog program had been approved after an investigation, including the recent referendum, had indicated its "economic justification."

Its principal objective, they explained, will be to maintain a balance between production and consumption of corn and hogs. They have recommended to the conference of farmers now under way that corn production next year be limited to 95,000,000 acres, compared with this year's 93,500,000 acreage.

The officials estimated that if there was no adjustment about 105,000,000 acres would be harvested. To bring the figure down to 95,000,000, they said, would require a reduction in base acreage of about 20 per cent by contract signers. This year's reduction averaged about 23 per cent. A 25 per cent maximum reduction has been suggested for 1937.

settled forever the liberty of every individual to travel, work and trade anywhere in the nation.

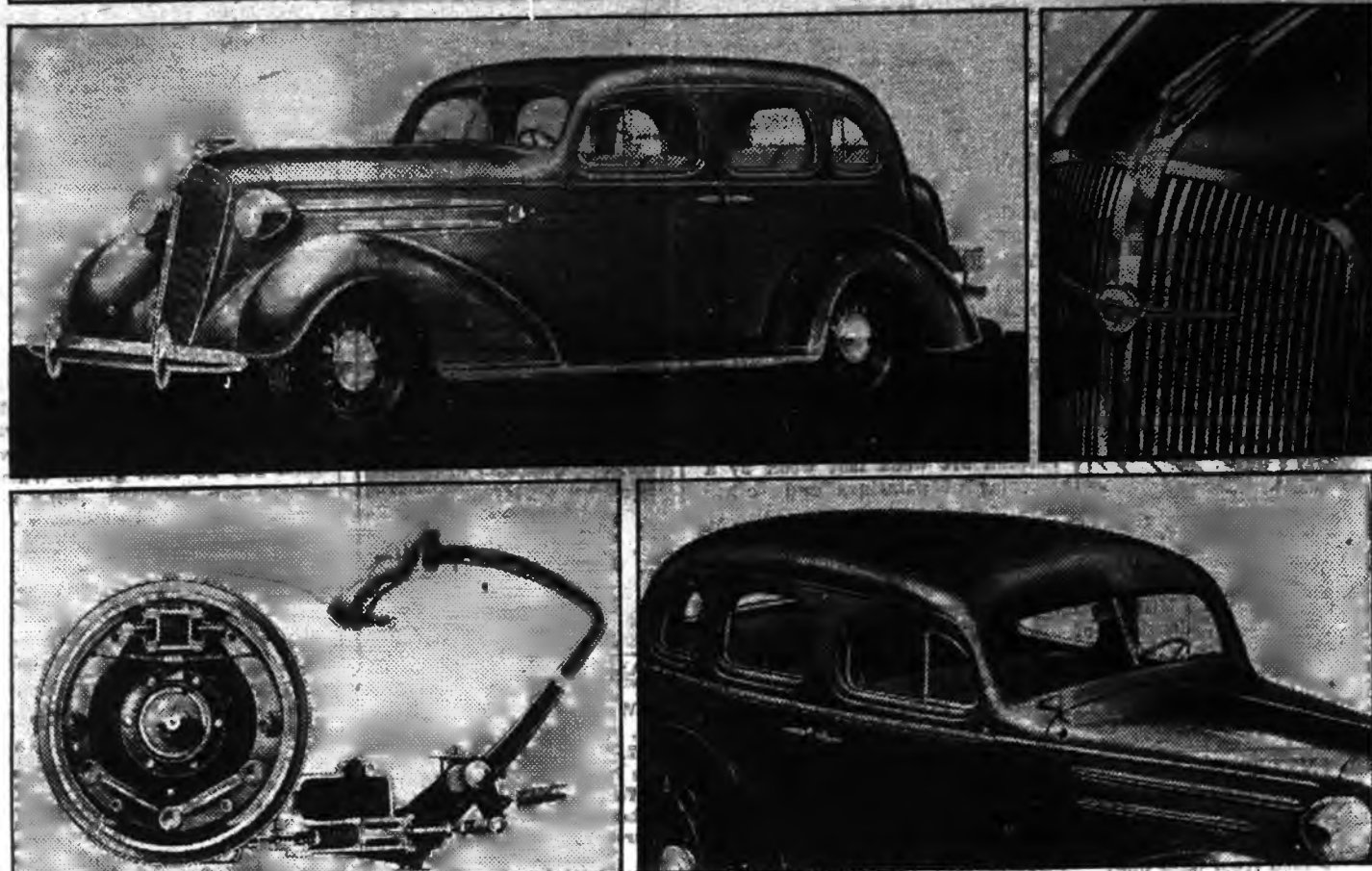

The fundamental teaching of Christianity is the brotherhood of man under the fatherhood of God. Churches and sects have overlaid and obscured this basic teaching with such a variety of doctrines that the essential principle seems almost to be lost sight of in much of our religious teaching.

Most of the other great religions of the world have a similar foundation. I am firmly convinced that the world is far better than it would have been had it not been for the influence of the great religious teachers. But I am also convinced that most of us are a long way, still, from really believing in and acting upon the teachings of religion.

Maybe it will take 10,000 years, maybe longer, but the only ultimate answer to the question of war or peace must be, it seems to me, the acceptance by the whole human race of the underlying principles of religion.

# Protestant Churches To Join In Peace Movement On Armistice Day

On a scale never before attempted the youth of the Protestant churches of the United States and Canada will join in a demonstration for peace on Armistice Day, Monday, November 11, at 10:30 a. m.

Nation-wide plans have been made and organization is being perfected by the Joint Committee on United Program which has in its membership representatives both of youth organizations and of official church bodies such as Boards of Education of the major denominations. The affair will be part of the inter-denominational program known as "Christian Youth Building a New World." These organizations have a combined youth membership of over ten million.

Members of the national committee are Al Hamilton, Chicago; Truman Kirkpatrick, Chicago; Charles Paape, Elmhurst, Ill.; Robert Preston, Chicago; Bess Hunter Robinson, Chicago; Elizabeth Hylbert, New York; P. R. Hayward, Chicago; Owen M. Geer, Chicago; Frances Greenough, New York; Max Adams, Philadelphia; A. R. Elliott, New York; Walter VanKirk, New York; and Hiel D. Bollinger, Chicago. State and regional chairmen have been appointed throughout the United States.

The demonstrations will proceed by means of a parade including both marchers and floats. All parades will stop at 11 a. m. for two minutes of silent prayer in commemoration of the heroic dead and, also, that wars may cease and that the United States may not be drawn into international conflicts. Following the parades there will be mass meetings.

In some localities, especially the metropolitan centers, Sunday, November 10, is being substituted for the later date.

This demonstration differs from that of April 12, 1935, popularly known as "The Student Strike Against War," in one important particular. The forthcoming demonstration will be solely and entirely under Christian auspices. The April demonstration was motivated by economic and political groups as well as by several avowedly Christian organizations. The former organizations are not being included in the Armistice Day observances—though as religiousists their individual members will be welcome.

Christian Youth Building a New World, the Joint Committee on Youth Program, and the special committee in charge of this peace demonstration have the official support of such bodies as the Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational churches, and the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. Individual pastors and church vestries in many towns and cities are lending their leadership.

All are employees of the W. S. Lee Construction Company, of Washington, D. C., contractors on the project.

W. T. Bauguess, 53, of Thurmond, the most seriously injured of the quartet, sustained a broken shoulder, a severely fractured wrist and d bruises; Harvey Brooks, 23, of State Road, sustained lacerations on the head; Grady Lewis, 24, of State Road, sustained an ugly laceration on his eye and many painful bruises; Floyd Dalton, colored, 23, of Dobson, sustained extensive bruises.
