FIVE PRISONERS ESCAPE IN WAKE

Raleigh, Nov. 20.—Five state prisoners were at liberty tonight after breaking their way to freedom in escapes from prison gangs working in divergent sections of Wake county.

Heavy armed officers, searching for the men late today, had little hope of capturing more than one of them tonight. Four of the prisoners leaped from a highway department truck near Holly Springs, overpowered, and disarmed a guard and made their way south toward Harnett county, prison officials said.

The fifth prisoner, who escaped from a gang working in a gravel pit near the city, was believed early tonight to be surrounded in the woods near Whitaker's Mill. Officers said they did not believe the escapee, Harold Wilson, would be able to break through the cordon drawn around the section.

150 State Drivers Licenses Have Already Been Revoked

Raleigh, Nov. 20.—Capt. Charles D. Farmer, of the state highway patrol, estimated today that 150 North Carolina automobile drivers have already had their permits revoked or suspended by the patrol due to traffic violations.

The permits have only been required since November 1.

Most of the revocations, Captain Farmer said, have been for drunken driving.

He estimated "at least 3000" permits would be revoked or suspended during November.

Senator Reynolds left the United States recently with Vice President Garner and his official party to attend the inauguration of Manuel Quezon as first president of the new republic in the Philippine Islands. The ceremony was at Manila.
