

R. S. Proctor, assistant director in charge of student aid for the National Youth Administration in North Carolina, recently released the following article, which no doubt will be of interest to people of many communi-

One of the objectives of the fect." National Youth Administration is the sponsoring of vocational guidance service to youth. So far as the North Carolina Youth Administration is concerned sponsoring must necessarily mean rendering aid in the nature of suggestions and plans for organizing the service locally on a voluntary basis. The limited staff of the State Administration makes it impossible to give much time in personal supervision of guidance services to any single community.

However, guidance of youth is, after all, a community or local responsibility. There are two groups of youths that need guidance-the in-school group and t h e out-of-school, unemployed group. The logical agency for the guidance of the in-school group is the local school. The agency for the guidance of the out-ofschool, unemployed group is that agency which, seeing the tremendous need, will assume the responsibility.
