

Better Times Predicted For South In 1936

Atlanta, Nov. 20.—Signs of increasing prosperity are seen in the South by governors of nine of its states, a majority of whom predict an accelerated climb toward better times in 1936.

From Arkansas to Virginia, same reports today of improved conditions with Governor Dave Sholtz of Florida, saying his state, enjoying its best season in five years, is leading the nation back to prosperity.

"Our development this year has been safe and sane," said Sholtz. "From every standpoint the year 1935 has been the best in Florida since the boom period."

Governor Eugene Talmadge of Georgia, outspoken against the Roosevelt administration, said "Georgia is making sturdy, straggling efforts to a sound, fundamental recovery. She is getting results in spite of the new deal."

South Carolina's Governor Olin D. Johnston said his state has made "remarkable" progress.

"Particularly in far-seeing and far-reaching legislation," added Johnston. "The future, I sincerely believe, holds for our state a more solid prosperity and a more substantial economic and social security than we have known before."

Governor J. C. B. Ehringhaus of North Carolina, said better business conditions and improved methods of tax collection are being reflected in increased state revenues.

"We are operating on a balanced budget," Governor Ehringhaus said, "and this has enabled us to get lower interest rates for war securities, including an all-time low record rate of 2.76 per cent for bonds, established this year."

"Better conditions have enabled us steadily and substantially to reduce the principal of our public debt and meet interest payments."

MARRIAGE QUESTIONNAIRE REVEALS QUEER THINGS

A survey of 1,000 marriage license applicants in seven American cities made by the Marital Relations Institute recently showed that only about half expected the marriage to last more than seven years, according to Jack Anthony, director.

The survey included questionnaires filled in by 13,000 women and 5,000 men. Anthony said, in New York, Philadelphia, Chicago, Atlanta, Salt Lake City, San Francisco and Cleveland.

A query as to the purpose of marriage brought answers from only nine out of each 100. Children figured in plans of 82 per cent of the men and 27 per cent of the women.

Fifty-six per cent said they were marrying "for love."

Only 31 per cent expected their marriage to last "forever," while 14 per cent said seven years and 58 per cent estimated the tie would endure for five years.

wounds of others, strive against disorder and aggression, encourage the lessening or distress among people and advance perpetual trade and friendship.

"The future of many generations of mankind will be greatly guided by our acts in these present years. We have a new trial. Let us then on the day appointed offer our devotions and our humble thanks to Almighty God and pray that the people of America will be guided by him in helping their fellowmen.

"In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

"Done at the city of Washington this 12th day of November, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and thirty-five, and of the independence of the United States of America the one hundred and sixteenth."

Speaks On Farm Credit

Valdosta, Ga., Nov. 20.—Production credit associations are not relief agencies or temporary institutions but are part of a permanent system of farm credit. Judge Harry D. Reed, general counsel of the Farm Credit Administration of Columbia, said today in an address before a regional meeting of the Georgia Vegetable Growers Association here.

"While the depression compelled the government to make direct loans to farmers as it has done to industry," said Judge Reed "it is expected that in the near future the government will retire from the field of direct loans. Permanent credit institutions like the production credit associations will then be left to provide credit to farmers on a cooperative basis and on reasonable terms. Already farmer-borrowers from production credit associations own \$7,000,000 of the capital of those institutions."

Judge Reed said that production credit associations are established to supplement and not to supplant credit from other agencies. "It is not expected," he said "that they will monopolize the farm credit field. There is a place for both private and cooperative agencies in farm financing."

Farmer Kills Self

Raleigh, Nov. 24.—Marcus Britt, 34, near Garner, was found shot to death this morning near the home of his brother, Troy Britt, of Garner. Coroner L. M. Waring and Deputy Sheriff Clyde Whitaker, who investigated the case, said Britt shot himself with a shotgun and a formal inquest was not necessary.
