Registrars May Sell Name Lists

Catawba, May 25.—D. E. McShane, federal officer of Charlotte, was shot and painfully, but not seriously wounded this afternoon as he sat in his car on a rural road about three miles northwest of here while his partner, Federal Officer J. W. Hersey, also of Charlotte, searched nearby woodlands for an illicit whisky still. His assailant, who drove up in another car with three companions, escaped during an exchange of shots with the officers. Hersey was not hit.

The identity of the man who shot Officer McShane, and at least one or two of his companions, was reported to be known to the federal agents. Sheriff D. Barrs and Deputies Ray Pitts and F. L. Alley of Catawba county, took bloodhounds to the scene of the attack but were unable to trace the car used.

Tharpe Withdraws From The Primary

Prominent Bonds Citizen Will Not Seek Nomination For Sheriff on June 5

C. C. Tharpe, prominent Bonds citizen and a widely known Republican leader in Wilkes county, Tuesday issued a statement to the effect that he is withdrawing from the race for the Republican nomination for sheriff in the primary to be held on June 5.

His statement, addressed to neighbors, friends and the Republican voters of Wilkes county, is quoted as follows:

"Some time ago I filed my name at the request of a number of my friends for the Republican nomination for sheriff of Wilkes County. Since that time I have talked to numerous Republicans from all parts of Wilkes County and have been gratified at the expressions of friendship that I have received, and I am particularly pleased with the expressions of confidence and offers of support that my friends and neighbors have seen fit to give me. However, it is my judgment now that the best interests of the Republican party will be served by avoiding a bitter fight for the Republican nomination in the coming primary, and I am therefore withdrawing my name from consideration in the primary. I wish to state that I am and shall be forever grateful to my neighbors and friends for their well wishes, and I shall always be found fighting for our party and the candidates who support the principles of the party, and also the candidates in the primary who have demonstrated their loyalty to the party; and most certainly as all my friends know I will be found in November backing every nominee of the Republican party to the limit of my ability."

Officer Wounded During Gun Fight

Raleigh, May 26.—Attorney General A. A. F. Beaswell ruled late today that practical registration may furnish persons meeting lists of voters with such lists and charge one cent per name instead of allowing registration books to be copied.

He cited the law, which provides that the public shall have access to the books for the purpose of copying, but provides the registrar had the right to determine whether the lists should be copied by the individual or whether lists would be furnished after being copied by the registrar. The one-cent-per-name fee is set up in the law.

The ruling was asked by R. C. Maxwell, secretary of the state board of elections.

VOTERS MAY DECLARE FOR PARTY AT POLLS

Raleigh, May 26.—Attorney General A. A. F. Beaswell ruled today registered voters whose party affiliation is not listed on registration books would have the right to participate in the primary of his party by satisfying officials of his proper affiliation.

Raymond C. Maxwell, secretary of the state board of elections, asked for the ruling and said it had been called to his attention many persons entitled to vote in the June primaries of the Democratic and Republican parties are not registered either as Democrats, Republicans or independents.

Maxwell said the attorney general held such voters should have the right to cast ballots by satisfying the registrars of their affiliation, but the vote would, of course, be subject to challenge by bona fides of such affiliation.

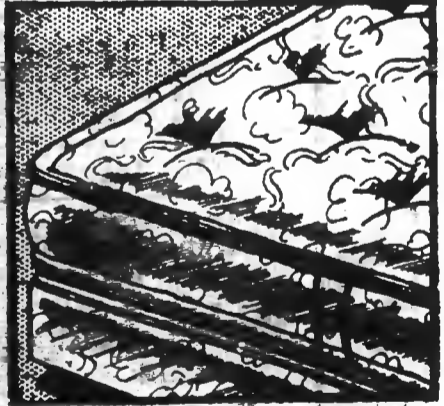
