PAID OUT OF DOG TAX People Warned To Observe Law; Dog's Head Sent to **Raleigh Tuesday**

Dr. A. J. Eller, county health officer, Tuesday mailed a dog's head to the state labratories at Raleigh and issued a public warning to people to have their dogs vaccinated against rabies according to law.

There is a false impression, Dr. Eller stated, that dogs only have to be vaccinated but once to be immune from rabies and he pointed out that the vaccination holds good for one year only and that all dogs should be vaccinated yearly. It really cost a dog offner nothing to have his dog

accinated because the cost is deducted from the dog tax to the county, the health officer said in Prefer Charges placing emphasis on the fact that he wanted all dogs vaccinated against rables in order that the danger of contracting hydrophobia be lessened.


