The payroll this month will aggregate approximately \$25,750. Of this amount \$27,730.90 will go to teachers with truck drivers, janitors and other employes receiving the remaining \$2,020.

This payroll includes all the schools on the county system but does not include North Wilkesboro schools, which operate as a charter unit. The city school payroll, amounting to about \$3,000, will be paid at the end of the second month, the city schools having opened a few days later than those of the county system.
