Parking Limited to Two Hours On Streets In Business Section
OTHER ORDINANCES
Govern Parking of Lengthy Trucks at Angle to Curb; Penalties Are Set

Congested traffic conditions did not prevail in North Wilkesboro today as police began enforcing the new ordinance restricting parking of automobile to two hours in the business district of the city. The ordinance was passed some time ago to go into effect today.

Parking limit signs have been posted at intervals along the streets upon which parking is limited but a number of summonses were attached to violators on the first day. Some tickets were issued to cars for incorrect parking in that they parked in the opposite direction from that specified in the ordinance.

The ordinance specifies a fine of not less than one dollar and not less than five dollars and cost for subsequent violations. The police department is also committed to strict enforcement of ordinances governing the parking of trucks, especially in regard to parking trucks of more than 17 feet overall length at an angle to the curb.

63 Years Old, His First Visit To Jail

J. F. Vanner, son of Uncle Sam Vanner, the Wilkesboro man, was in his first time in the county jail.

The purpose of the school survey made by Mr. Eller and the officials is to furnish highway information in regard to road conditions, including the number of miles of hard surfaced roads, improved dirt roads and almost impassable dirt roads over which school buses are routed.

A map will be prepared showing each section of school bus route which has been giving trouble and a supreme effort will be made to convince highway authorities that school buses cannot operate with any reasonable degree of success without such conditions such as:

During the past few weeks road forces have made some efforts to patch some of the worst spots on a few of the school bus and mail routes but these jobs are considered at best only temporary.

The recent failure of the roads has aroused unusual interest, expressed in terms of indignation, among many people of the county who no doubt will be heard from by road authorities.

There is also a revival of interest in learning when the state highway commission plans to complete two roads which have been constructed to or into Wilkes on three sides. Highway 268 has been constructed from Elkin to Ronda. From Ronda through the remainder of Wilkes to Patterson in Caldwell county the dirt road is in bad condition but a highway is being constructed on the west from Patterson to Lenoir.

A similar situation exists on highway 215. That highway has been constructed from Statesville to the Wilkes-Tredell line and has been on the pending list from that point to Wilkesboro for two or three years.
