Attorney Indicates Decision May Be Appealed; Argument Heard in City

Judge J. A. Rousseau, resident judge of the 17th judicial district, Saturday dissolved an order restraining the sheriff of Wilkes county from seizing and destroying slot machines.

Judge Rousseau held that the machines in question were gambling devices prohibited by law and that the sheriff had a legal right to seize and destroy them.

The order was taken out a hout ten days ago by two slot machine operators and J. H. Whicker appeared as their attorney. On the contention that the law passed by the 1937 legislature does not go into effect until July 1 and that it immediately repealed the slot machine law of 1935, Attorney Whicker indicated that Judge Rousseau's decision may be appealed to the supreme court.

During the past several days Sheriff C. T. Doughton and deputies have seized nine slot machines in the county.
