News was received here Tuesday morning by Charles H. Cowles of the death Monday night of his brother, Col. Calvin D. Cowles, at his home in Hartford,

Colonel Calvin Duvall Cowles was born June 20, 1849, and spent his boyhood days in Wilkesboro. After attending Guilford College, then known as New Gar-Point Military Academy. Graduating at West Point, he became an officer in the U.S. Army, serv ing as lieutenant, captain, major, lieutenant-colonel, and colonel. In the Spanish American War he served as lieutenant-colonel of the 1st N. C. Vol. Inf., and went with that regiment to Cuba. He took part in the following military campaigns: Northern Chevenne, 1878: Uncompangre Ute, 1880-81; Spanish American War, 1898; Cuban Occupation, 1898-99: Philippine Insurrection, 1900-02; Cuban Pacification, 1906-09: World War 1917-19. He was awarded six medals, one
