Over 200 Men are Being Used On County-Wide Project at Present

The number of people in Wilkes county aided through the Works Progress administration, principal federal relief agency, has been cut in half during the past year, figures at the office of the area supervisor here reveal.

Wilkes county is 274 men and 118 women and it is understood that foremen are working practically the full quota at all times. A year ago approximately 500 men were being used on WPA projects and at the peak of the agency 800 were given employ-

Of the 274 men allowed more than 200 are employed on the county road project, which has done some very beneficial work on many secondary road through Highway and Public Works commission.
