

State Democratic Convention Be On May 19 In Raleigh

May 7 Date Set for Precinct Meetings, and County Conventions 14th

The state Democratic convention will be held in Raleigh May 19, the State Democratic Executive Committee decided Friday night in a 27-minute meeting in the hall of the house of representatives in Raleigh.

The committee set May 7 as the time for precinct meetings and May 14 for county conventions. This action was taken on motion of W. D. Siler, of Siler City, seconded by Miss Ethel Parker, of Gates county. There was no opposition.

Convention Set for Noon
The state convention was set to convene at noon. The hour of the county and precinct meetings will be set by their respective chairmen.

In the brief session the group also adopted a resolution, offered by Ed Butler of Morganton, making the president of the Young Democratic Clubs of North Carolina an ex officio member of the Democratic executive committee.

R. Gregg Cherry, of Gastonia, committee chairman, presided.

"Boy this is a love feast, isn't it," Cherry exclaimed in introducing Lieutenant Governor W. P. Horton.

Governor Notes Harmony
In a short talk Governor Hoye noted the harmony of the meeting and said he was glad to see the "fine appreciation and understanding among the Democrats of our state."

Referring to the Democratic primary June 1, the Chief Executive added, "I hope that in the contests to come, all candidates will realize that the common good of the party should not suffer and be sacrificed for personal advancement."

He said he was thankful the party had not lost its "common touch" with the people, and expressed the desire that Democrats "move along together as a great, fine party, differing as we go but moving toward the common good of the people."

Others Heard
Both Lieutenant Governor Horton and Miss Beatrice Cobb of Morganton, national Democratic committeewoman and 28th dis-

trict candidate for the state senate, spoke briefly.
Cherry also presented Mrs. Hoye and Mrs. Horton.
Seventy-five committee members were present in person or by proxy.

Soliciting Funds For a Gymnasium

Fourth of Requirements Subscribed by Teachers of Millers Creek District

Millers Creek school community has begun the task of raising \$4,000 as part of the sponsor's contribution toward the erecting of a modern school gymnasium and for landscaping the grounds. Total cost of the project will be slightly over \$18,000, divided about fifty-fifty between the community as sponsor and the Works Progress administration. Materials now on hand and \$4,000 cash will be the sponsor's contribution.

Plans are now being formulated whereby the Millers Creek district will attempt to raise the \$4,000.00. An organization meeting was held at Millers Creek school February 17, at which time a building committee was organized and plans were outlined for raising the building fund.

R. V. Ray, district principal, was elected chairman of the building committee. Attorney Alie Hayes was elected vice-chairman and P. W. Greer was elected secretary-treasurer.

The building committee recommends the following distribution of the cost to be born by the Millers Creek district:

Emergency Crop Loans Available

J. E. Joines Receiving Applications for Crop Loans in Wilkesboro Office

Applications for emergency crop and feed loans for 1938 are now being received at Wilkesboro by J. E. Joines, Field Supervisor of the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan section of the Farm Credit Administration.

The loans will be made, as in the past, only to farmers who cannot obtain credit from any other source. The money loaned will be limited to the farmer's immediate and actual cash needs for growing his 1938 crops, or for the purpose of feed for livestock, and the amount which may be loaned to any one farmer in 1938 may not exceed \$400.

Farmers who can obtain the funds they need from an individual, production credit association, bank, or other concern are not eligible for crop and feed loans from the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Section of the Farm Credit Administration. The loans will not be made to standard rehabilitation clients whose current needs are provided for by the Farm Security Administration, formerly known as the Resettlement Administration.

As in the past, farmers who obtain emergency crop and feed loans will give as security a first lien on the crop financed, or a first lien on the livestock to be fed if the money borrowed is to be used to produce or purchase feed for livestock.

Where loans are made to tenants, the landlords, or others having an interest in the crops financed or the livestock to be fed, are required to waive their claims in favor of a lien to the Governor of the Farm Credit Administration until the loan is repaid.

Checks in payment of approved loans will be mailed from the Regional Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Office at Columbia, South Carolina.
