Relief Costs Are Rising, It is Said

Costs of public relief in January continued the rise recorded for the 3 preceding months according to figures issued today by the Social Security Board, through the Salisbury Field Office. Total Federal, State, and local costs incurred for aid to the needy in January, including earnings under the Works Program, amounted to \$207,000,000, an increase of about \$12,500,000 over the total for December.

The figures reported by the Board are compiled regularly in collaboration with other Federal agencies and State and local authorities. The January figure includes amounts for the various programs as follows: Assistance to the needy aged, to the needy blind, and to dependent children from Federal, State, and local funds under the Social Security Act, and other public assistance of these special types, \$40,000,000; earnings under the Works Program, including the Works Progress Administration and other Federal agencies through which wages were paid to persons certified as in need of re-

lat, \$88,000,000; Civilian Conservation Corps, \$29,000,000; subsistence grants under the Farm Security Administration, \$2,000,000; general relief in cash and in kind, by States and Territories, \$47,000,000. These sums represent aid received by the needy; administrative costs are not included.

On the basis of reports received by the Board, it was estimated, after allowance for duplications, that in January about 5.8 mil-

lion different households received public aid of one or more of the types mentioned above. This represents an increase of about a half million over the estimate for December.

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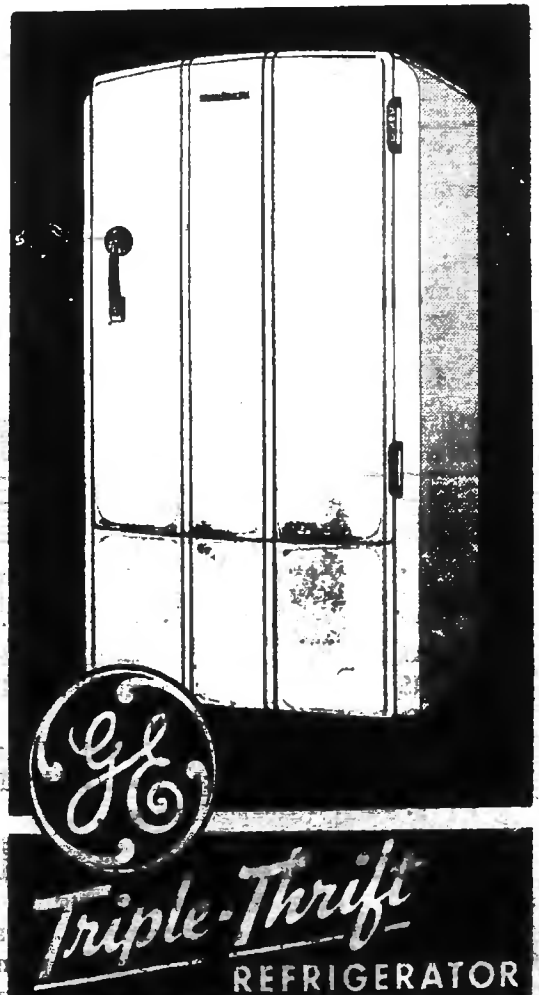
