

OUTDOOR LIVING ROOMS AND GARDEN RETREATS



Out-of-door living rooms or garden retreats are joys to farm women of North Carolina during the hot summer when the housework is over for an hour. For that reason the home demonstration division at State College, through its county home agents, is devoting more time and attention to this phase of home beautification. Miss Pauline Smith, district home agent, acts as home

beautification specialist and assists the home agents and farm women with their garden problems. She says the garden path should have surprises along its borders. It should lead to a place of interest with a terminus such as a seat, an arbor, a fountain, pool, or bird bath. The flagged terrace shown in the above picture was made of native rock and a rock wall would have been as

pretty, she suggests. The background of cedar and hemlock is native. The dogwood is an accent and the shrubs are laurel, called creek ivy in many North Carolina localities. Sweet myrtle, fetter bush, cranberry, or rhododendron might have been used as effectively. As a substitute for the wooden seat, half of a hardwood log, set on log legs, milk stool style, would be appropriate. In place of the old fountain, there might be a bird bath made from the hub of a car wheel, painted dark green; or a naturalistic pool; or just a seat under a crab-apple tree. Let the terrace be on an axis with the door or main living room window and watch the family look for the spot on a summer evening, she says.
