Method For Curing Pork On The Farm

One of the most common and most useful methods of curing pork on the farm is the dry cure method.

In the dry cure method: 8 pounds of salt, 3 ounces of saltpeter, 3 pounds of brown sugar is used for every 100 pounds of meat.

After the meat has cooled thoroughly one-half of this mixture is rubbed on the fresh meat. This meat is placed in a barrel or tight box for seven days. Then meat is taken out and the remaining half of this mixture is then added. On the 21st day after curing has started repack the meat, taking out the bacon and

other small pieces. The remaining meat should remain in cure three days per pound per piece.

After the curing is over take out the meat, wash in cold water and hang in a smoke house to drip for twenty-four hours before smoking is started. Be sure to hang the pieces so that they do not touch each other.

This curing method has been used throughout North Carolina for many years and has proven very satisfactory.

R. H. Barringer of Balls Creek, Catawba county, wanted a fish pond so he contracted with the county terracing unit to build him one. The water is led into the pond through a trough and the land around is terraced so that a minimum of silt can pollute the water.
