Sealed bids will be received until 11 o'clock a. m., March 14, 1939, by the undersigned at its office in the city of Raleigh, N. C., for \$14,000 Town Hall Bonds of the Town of North Wilkesboro, N. C., dated February 1, 1939, maturing annually on February 1, \$1500 1940 to 1947 and \$2000 1948, without option of prior payment. There will be no auction. Denomination \$500; coupon bonds not registerable; principal and interest (F & A 1) payable in lawful money at the office of the Treasurer of the Town of North Wilkesboro or at the option of the holder, at the Chase National Bank of New York City; general obligations; unlimited tax; delivery at place of purchaser's choice.

Bidders are requested to name the interest rate or rates, not exceeding six per cent per annum in multiples of one-fourth of one per cent. Each bid may name one rate for part of the bonds (having the earliest maturities) and another rate for the balance, but no bid may name more than two rates, and each bidder must specify in his bid the amount of bonds of each rate. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder offering to purchase the bonds at the lowest interest cost to the Town, such cost to be determined by deducting the total amount of the premium bid from the aggregate amount of interest upon all of the bonds until their respective maturities. No bid of less than par and accrued interest will be entertained.

Bids must be enclosed in a sealed envelope marked "Proposal for Bonds" and be accompanied by a certified check upon an incorporated bank or trust company, payable unconditionally to the order of the State Treasurer of North Carolina for \$280.
