Bikin, Feb. 16.—The second suicide attempt of Samuel Barton, 32, Dobson farmer, in two weeks, proved successful yesterday, when a shotgun load fired into his heart proved instantly fatal.

The gun, purchased September, had been hidden in his barn two miles from Dobson.

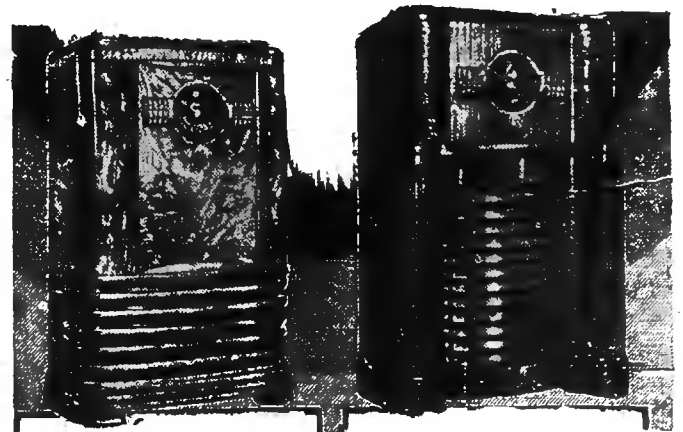
