Phosphoric Acid gave no significant increase in yield, but resulted in a significant decrease on the Ruston loamy sand in Bertic. A complete fertilizer (100 pounds of 2-8-4) gave a significant increase only on the Norfolk very fine sandy loam in Edgecombe, but this yield was no

larger than for potash alone. The agronomists pointed out that the peanut grower is primarily interested in the value of h's erep when sold on the market, and therefore must consider quality as well as the yield in bags per acre. In reporting the results of the investigation; all figures were based on the equivalent number of bags that would shell 60 per cent good nuts.
