### Finals For City School Will Be Held On May 30

Dr. Robin J. Maaske To Be Speaker; Sermon On Sunday, May 28th

The series of closing programs of the school year in the North Wilkesboro Public Schools begins Wednesday afternoon, May 17th, at 2:00 o'clock, when the pupils of the Home Economics department will present their Fashion Show and display of their work during the past year. The high school student body and the public will be invited to the program. Immediately following there will be a tea in the Home Economics rooms for the mothers of the pupils.

The music pupils of Miss Ellen Robinson will be presented in their Spring recital at 8:00 o'clock on the evening of Monday, May 22nd, in the school auditorium.

On Sunday night, May 28th, the Baccalaureate Sermon to the graduating class will be delivered in the auditorium of the First Baptist church. Music will be supplied by a chorus of Junior and Senior High school pupils. The sermon on the subject "Youth and Tomorrow" will be delivered by Dr. Donald S. Stuart, of Chapel Hill.

The annual class day exercises will be presented by the graduating class at 8:00 o'clock on Monday night, May 29th.

The final program of the year, at which diplomas will be presented to the seventh grade graduates and the high school seniors, will take place in the auditorium on Tuesday night, May 30th. The literary address will be given by Dr. Robin J. Maaske, of the University of North Carolina.

### Tubercular Clinic Now Under Way

A tuberculosis clinic began Monday in Wilkesboro and will continue for two weeks. Dr. L. B. Skeen, a specialist from state sanatorium, is making the examinations, which are without cost to the patients, and there has been much response to the plea by Dr. A. J. Eller, county health officer, that suspects take advantage of the clinic. The county health office, where the clinic is being conducted, has appointments sufficient to keep the specialist busily engaged during the remainder of this week but several dates are open during the second week, health authorities said today.

### Suicide Pheasant Dinner Enjoyed

G. I. Foster, a resident of the Park-R F. D. community, recently enjoyed a pheasant dinner out of season. But the game warden doesn't have to bother about it because Mr. Foster did not kill the pheasant and no one else did—it was a plain case of suicide. Persons in Mr. Foster's home heard something hit the house with considerable force. They went outside and there lay a large pheasant breathing its last. It had crashed into the side of the house and its breast bone was broken.

### To Loan Money on Expected Checks

Farm Security Administration To Aid Farmers In Planting Crops

Officials of the Wilkes county agricultural conservation association said today that by cooperation of the AAA and Farm Security Administration a plan has been devised for aiding needy farmers to finance seedling of crops for compliance with the soil program this year.

To those who cannot otherwise comply with provisions of the program for which payment will be made the Farm Security Administration will loan money for the purchase of seeds and equipment. The anticipated soil program check will be security for the loan and the loan will be a first lien on the payment to be earned. These loans are limited to those who could not otherwise comply with the program without aid and the maximum payment allowed for the farm will be the limit on the size of the loans.

### May Session Of Federal Court Gets Under Way

Two-Weeks Term For Trial Cases In Four Counties Began On Monday

May term of federal court for trial of cases in Wilkes, Alleghany, Ashe and Watauga counties convened in Wilkesboro Monday for a two-weeks' term. Judge Johnson J. Hayes, of Wilkesboro, is presiding over the term, and the criminal docket will be tried first.

District Attorney Carlyle Higgins, of Sparta, and his assistants are prosecuting the docket. Practically all of the cases calendared are for alleged violation of the liquor tax laws and the docket contains about the average number of cases:

### Special Term Of Court Called To Begin June 19th

Two-Weeks Special Term To Follow Regular Term; Criminal Cases Only

A. H. Casey, president of the Wilkes bar association, said today that a special term of Wilkes superior court has been called to convene in Wilkesboro on Monday, June 19.

The term will follow the term for trial of civil cases, which will convene on Monday, June 5, for two weeks. Both terms will make a total of four weeks of Wilkes court during the month of June.

Judge Wilson Warlick, of Newton, who will preside over the regular term, will also preside over the special term, Mr. Casey said. The special term will be for trial of criminal cases only and there will be a grand jury for the purpose of passing on new bills only. Avalon E. Hall, of Yadkinville, 17th district solicitor, will prosecute the docket. Despite the headway made on the docket in the regular March term, many cases are awaiting trial.

### W. E. Smithey Named Member Welfare Board

Commissioners Name New Member To Succeed Dr. W. W. Miles June 1

W. E. Smithey, merchant and well known resident of Wilkesboro, has been appointed to the Wilkes county welfare board.

The appointment was made by the county board of commissioners in recess meeting this month. Mr. Smithey will succeed Dr. W. W. Miles, whose term will expire on June 1.

The board will then be composed of Mr. Smithey, Wm. A. Stroud and P. J. Brame. Mr. Brame was appointed by the state welfare authorities for a three year term last year and Mr. Stroud was appointed by the other two members of the board and his term will expire next year.

Among the duties of the welfare board are the passing or rejecting of applications for old age assistance and aid to dependent children and in Wilkes county by special act of the legislature the welfare board elects the county superintendent of welfare.

### Summer School To Begin Here Monday, June 5

Courses Will Be Offered To Out-Of-School People As Well As Students

A summer session of the North Wilkesboro schools will be operated this year, beginning on June 5, Paul S. Cragan, superintendent, announced today.

The school will be under the direction of Robert G. Taylor, of the high school faculty, and other teachers will be chosen from the regular faculty, dependent on the number of teachers enrolled for the subjects to be taught.

In addition to allowing students to make up subjects in which they fail, the school will serve a broader service in supplying instruction in hand music by Mr. Grier and commercial subjects under Miss Miller to any students or out-of-school people who wish to enroll.

The school will offer an adequate course in commercial subjects and this department is expected to be used by many during the summer term.

In regular school work the summer pupils will be limited to one new subject or two make-up subjects.

Those who desire further information may call the superintendent's office or either of the teachers for the summer school.

### Arrest Of Boys Solves Thefts

Police Chief J. E. Walker reported today the solution of two breaking and entering cases during the past two weeks.

Jimmie McGlamery, J. D. and John R. Call, all of juvenile age, were haled before Juvenile Judge C. C. Hayes this morning and sentenced to a training school. They confessed to breaking into C. A. Forester's store on Forester Avenue and to breaking into Hayes Hardware company store on Tenth street.

On Friday night entrance was gained into Hayes Hardware store, where the boys are said to have taken two rifles, several boxes of shells, four watches, six flashlights and several pocket knives. Officers suspected the boys, who had been in trouble before, and after a watch which had been taken from the hardware store was found on one of them they confessed, Chief Walker said.

About \$15 worth of cigarettes, cigars and candy was taken from Mr. Forester's store and was not recovered. The merchandise taken from the Hardware store was found hidden on the banks of the Yadkin river between the Wilkesboro.

### Cripple Clinic Here Successful

Thirty-Four Given Examinations In Clinic At Local Hospital Thursday

The cripple clinic held Thursday at the Wilkes hospital was one of the most successful ever held in Wilkes, health authorities said today.

A total of 34 were examined in the clinic by Dr. O. L. Miller, of Charlotte, an orthopedic surgeon. Many of those examined were new cases which had never before been in a clinic and some had been treated at orthopedic hospitals and were given a check-up examination.

Arrangements are being made to have several of the new cases treated, it was learned today. The work among crippled children in Wilkes is sponsored by the North Wilkesboro Kiwanis club, which defrays clinic expenses and cost of transportation of the children to and from the state hospital at Gastonia.
