### Beer Distributors Plan For Campaign

Charlotte. — North Carolina beer distributors from all sections of the state, in cooperation with the United Brewers Industrial Foundation, this afternoon met here to inaugurate a self-regulatory plan for the betterment of retail trade conditions and simultaneously served notice of pending action against any offending retailers with the adopted campaign slogan of: "Clean-Up or Close-Up"  
Statewide activities will be conducted under the newly formed Brewers and North Carolina Beer Distributors Committee and will be under the immediate direction of a state director and an executive committee composed of five representatives of brewing firms operating within the state and an equal number of beer distributors. Headquarters will be maintained in Raleigh. A comprehensive advertising campaign will be utilized in the effort to rid the state of retail outlets whose business conduct brands them as unworthy outlets for malt beverage distribution. Under the plan today announced, report of law-violating outlets will be made by district committeemen to the office of the state director. Investigation of charges will be made, and, if substantiated, representatives of the Brewers and North Carolina Beer Distributors Committee will present evidence before the proper legal authorities with the request for suspension or revocation of licenses, or for such other punitive action as may be deemed necessary. When licenses are revoked or suspended, the State Director will notify the membership of the State Committee to withhold further sales of malt beverages from the offenders. District committees will function in ten districts throughout the state, embracing approximately ten counties to the district.

### Man Hunted For Slaying Found Dead

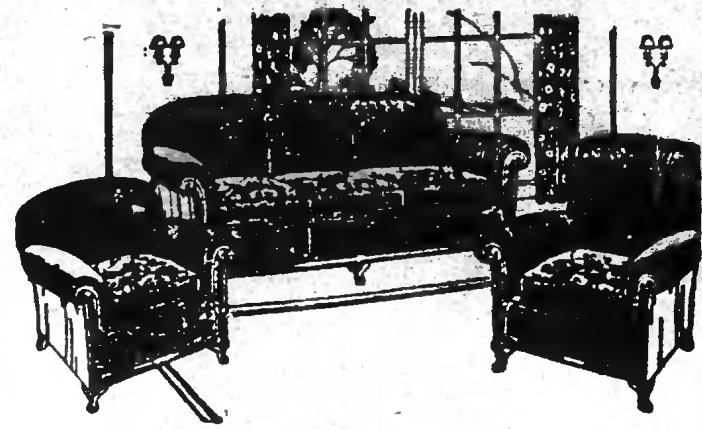
Waterloo, Ill., May 16.—A 41-year-old man who had been hunted as the killer of a young woman and his rival for her affections was found shot to death today in a locked automobile on a country road 14 miles northeast of here.  
The man, identified by Sheriff William J. Curran as Gus Buettner, became the object of an intensive search by a large number of armed citizens and officers after the slaying of the young Waterloo couple as they were en route to a dance Sunday night.  
The victims were Miss Hattie Grosse, 20, who the sheriff said had refused to accept Buettner's attentions, and her companion, Willis Wetzler, 25.
