Building And Loan Home Loans Increase

For the fourth consecutive month the home loans made by the building, savings and loan associations of North Carolina showed an increase over the preceding month, according to Wheeler Martin of Williamston, President of the North Carolina Building and Loan League. The June total of \$2,412,000 in loans made by these institutions is the largest amount of monthly loans made by the building, savings and loan associations during the past five years. It was stated by Martin. He said that of this total \$865,000 representing 480 loans was for construction of new homes. 323 homes to the amount of \$557,000 were purchased through the building, savings and loan associations and 218 loans, to the amount of \$407,000 were refinanced through these institutions; while the balance of 532 loans, to the amount of \$583,000, were made for repairs, refinancing, reconditioning of homes and for miscellaneous purposes.

Ferguson Retains State Fight Crown And All-Stars Tie Here Friday Night

Wins By Knockout Over Ted Bass In First Round Of Fight Here Friday

"Countryboy" Ferguson, a product of Wilkes county, retained his crown as welterweight of North Carolina here Friday by virtue of knockout over Ted Bass of Winston-Salem in the first round of a scheduled 10 round bout. The fatal blow, a right to the pit of the stomach came in the first few seconds of the fight. Bass claimed the blow was low and after the referee had worked on him for five minutes and he was unable to continue the fight the bout was awarded to Ferguson.

Ferguson, the champion, entered the ring with a record of 42 fights won with only two losses while three have been draws. Bass had won 31, losing 2 and fought 2 draws.

The curtain raiser was a 4 round bout between Thomas of Greensboro and Snyder of High Point which was more of a 'love-feast' than a fight and at the end of the match the fight was called a draw by the judges.

The second fight, an eight round bout between Jones of Burlington and Wilson of Greensboro, proved to be the best battle of the evening. Both fighters came out swinging leather and continued to do so until Jones' seconds threw in the towel in the fifth round after he had gone down for a count several times in the round.

In the semi-finals Talley (132) of Salisbury won over Snyder (129) of Greensboro by a knockout in the third round of a scheduled eight round bout.

The fight was staged under the auspices of the American Legion and a large crowd of enthusiastic fight fans was on hand.

"During the pastorate of the late W. E. Linney we began under his constant urge to dream of a larger and better church building. However, nothing was done about it until our present pastor, C. C. Holland, persuaded us to launch a building program. The late Rev. W. C. Meadows labored untiringly in behalf of the cause of the present building, and to his memory has been dedicated the tablet near the pulpit. After ten years of tireless effort, on behalf of those interested in this cause, we have a finished church. Thus we say, 'Paul may plant; Apollos may water, but God alone giveth the increase.'"

The pastorate record at Walnut Grove is unusually interesting, containing as it does the names of many of the past century's famous preachers of the state. Those included are the Reverend John Bryan, George Swain, Alex. Gilreath, Peter Tritt, James Kerley, L. P. Gwaltney, one of the state's greatest preachers who probably served his first pastorate at Walnut Grove in 1871, R. L. Steele, J. P. Gwaltney, G. W. Green, I. T. Prevette, S. D. Barnes, D. W. Poole, C. C. Poole, W. R. Bradshaw, J. G. Weatherman, T. E. Redmon, E. V. Bumgarner, J. M. McAlpine, W. E. Linney, and C. C. Holland.

With the dedication of their new church the people of Pores Knob section completed an example of community cooperation. With only approximately 250 members, they financed the building of a church than any community should be glad to possess.

The present pastor of Walnut Grove church is the Rev. C. C. Holland, Taylorsville. The church was founded in 1845, and since that time a number of famous preachers of the state have served the pastorate there. A short historical sketch prepared for the dedication service by W. A. Jennings, church clerk, will give an idea of the unusual history of Walnut Grove church. Part of the sketch follows:

"The first church erected at Walnut Grove was built of hewed logs. It was heated by means of a chimney built of rough rock and banked with red clay. The chimney had a huge fireplace into which long logs could be placed. "The only windows in the building were openings made by removing a piece of log on each side of the wall. The seats were made of split logs into which pegs were fastened for legs.

"The log building served as a church house at Walnut Grove from 1845 to 1880, when it was replaced by a frame building, then considered modern. The frame building served until 1929, when
