Injury Proves Fatal To Oakes

Accidental Wound Becomes Infected After Being Dismissed From Hospital

SERVICES HELD SUNDAY

Injuries received three weeks ago when the limb of a tree splashed his throat while he was walking in the woods near his home proved fatal Friday to John Henry Oakes, 58, of near Boonville, well-known Yadkin county farmer.

Mr. Oakes was brought to the hospital here shortly after he was found in a serious condition from loss of blood. He was discharged from the hospital several days ago but returned for treatment a week before his death, after the wound had become infected.

The deceased was a member of Harmony Grove Friends church. Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at Boonville Baptist church. Interment was in the church cemetery.

He is survived by his wife, three daughters, Mrs. V. M. Ray, and Rachel and Ruth Oakes; two sons, Clyde Oakes and Henry Oakes.


