Wilkes county all stars and North Wilkesboro's semi-pro baseball teams will meet again here Sunday afternoon in another sports headliner event.

A game between the two teams was played two weeks ago and was called with the score tied at 3-3 in the eighth inning because of the six o'clock curfew law on Sunday games.

With supporters of both teams showing much interest the tie game left the subject of who could win all muddled up and a second game was scheduled. The game will begin at 2:30 in order to allow ample playing time.

The probable lineup for the all stars has Russell, of Boomer, in the right outer garden; Adkins, of Boomer, at short; Person, of Moravian Falls, in the hot corner; Eller, of Purlear, on the initial sack; Osborne, of Purlear, manager and short; Willis, of Rock Creek, as keystone sacker; Miller, of Moravian Falls, catcher; Cooper, of Purlear, left field; Mullis, of Moravian Falls, McDonald and Price as the hurlers.

North Wilkesboro will have Meade, Jarvis, Byrd, Reavi, and Wiles as outfield material; Templeton on second; Dula at short; Jones on third; O. Jones on first; Gilbert as second sacker and catcher; Ichnhour and Watkins as catchers; and Rhoades, Hamby and Nichols will be the pitching staff.

Sale Of Chevrolets Gains Last Month

Detroit, Aug. 8. — Chevrolet dealers' retail sales of new cars and trucks in the final 10 days of July showed a gain of 2,816 units over the previous 10-day period, totalling 24,612, and enabling the company to chalk up 64,917 cars and trucks for the month. The announcement was made here today by W. E. Holler, general sales manager. The month's new unit sales were 13,907 greater than in July 1938, for a gain of 27.2 per cent. Comparison of records indicates continuance of substantial volume so late into the summer was characterized as a distinct reversal of the usual trend.

Sales of used cars in the final 10-day period of July totaled 69,891, a gain of 19,118 over the preceding period, for a total of 160,760 in July. This is an increase of 25,091 units, as compared with July 1938, and gave Chevrolet dealers a combined new and used car total of 225,677 for the month.

PWA Building Jobs In South Decline

There has been a tapering off of PWA building activity in the South during the past six weeks, Regional Director Harry A. Wortham announced today. Many projects are rapidly nearing completion or are already finished.

All workers on these projects were employed on private payrolls and whether they labored in skilled trades or unskilled pursuits all of them received a prevailing wage in the locality where they were hired, Wortham said.

Figures in the Atlanta regional office showed the peak of employment was reached June 17 when 43,750 men worked at PWA building sites. At present 35,160 men are employed.

While an employment peak for nine states in region three was reached in June, the peak of employment in each state was hit at varying times from last February until late July, figures disclosed.

Alabama employments reached a ceiling during the week of May 27 when 6,100 were working on PWA jobs. The number at work today is 5,220 men.

The peak was reached in Florida during the week of February 25 when 2,820 men were working compared with 2,000 men employed today.

Georgia reached an employment high the week of April 1 with 6,390 men at work compared with 3,410 men now.

Kentucky workmen numbered 5,810 on PWA building sites the week of June 3 and 4,860 men today.

Mississippi employment totalled 2,710 men the week of June 24 and numbers 2,610 men now. North Carolina saw 7,364 men at work during the week of April 22 compared with 5,950 men at work now.

South Carolina reached a peak employment—excluding the Santee-Cooper project under the direction of Kenneth Markwell—of 4,720 men the week of July 22 and 3,250 are employed at present.

Tennessee had 5,280 men working at PWA building sites during the week of April 29. The number of workmen is now 4,010.

In Virginia a peak was reached of 4,210 men at work during the week of May 27 and 3,850 men are employed at present.

To ascertain total employment under the PWA program, the workmen in industry supplying building materials for one-site construction must also be considered, Wortham said.

A Department of Labor survey showed that for every hour of labor required on PWA building sites another two and one-half hours is needed in industry to supply materials, Wortham said.

Over 35,000 workmen have been continuously employed on PWA construction in region three since last February 25 when new work accelerated the demand for labor.

Blue Ridge Church, To Have Home Coming And Dedication On August 13

Several of northwest North Carolina's most prominent men are on the program for the annual home coming and church dedication to be held at Blue Ridge church on the Blue Ridge Parkway eight miles east of Deep Gap on Sunday, August 13.

A federal judge, a congressman, a college president and a state legislator are among the speakers expected for the occasion, the announcement issued here said.

They are: Judge Johnson J. Hayes, of Wilkesboro, middle district federal jurist; R. L. Doughton, ninth district congressman and chairman of the Ways and Means committee; Dr. B. B. Dougherty, president of A. S. T. C. in Boone; and Ira T. Johnston, Ashe county's representative in the state legislature.

The day's program will open at ten o'clock with unveiling of three pictures by children from

the vacation daily Bible school. The pictures are gifts to the church by friends. The remainder of the morning session will be devoted to singing by local and visiting classes.

At one o'clock the dedication of the church building will be in charge of Rev. Walter Whittington, pastor of the Baptist church at West Jefferson, and the local pastor, Rev. Henry Smith.

The beautiful new brick church, which the people of the mountain community and friends have erected and paid for, is in a picturesque location directly on top of the main formation of the Blue Ridge and fronts the Blue Ridge Parkway. It is almost on the Wilkes-Ashe county line and from the church grounds visitors are afforded a wonderful panoramic view of the surrounding countryside.
