Sales during the time the curb market was operated each Saturday totaled \$966.76, Miss McGoogan said, and explained that the market had been very beneficial to the rural women participating. The market will be open on Saturday morning from nine a. m. until noon.

No child can be expected to do efficient work under a situation in which he is uncomfortable, too cold, and not able to see. This is also injurious to the child's health.

Working under such handicaps should be an incentive by which the patrons of the school will be led to realize the needs and provide them in order that their child will have a modern and comfortable situation in which to get an education.

The second Tuesday in each month during the school year was set as the regular meeting time for the association. We would like to have all the patrons out for each of these meetings regardless of whether they are paid members or not.—Reported.
