N. C. First State To Clean Up Campaign Continues In State

Raieigh. — The Brewers and North Carolina Beer Distributors Committee's campaign to rid communities of objectionable beer outlets has been extended into the eastern, western and pledmont sections of the state.

During the month of October, the committee petitioned the boards of commissioners of four counties to revoke the retail beer licenses of nine dealers. Information on which other petitions will be based was compiled during the month and will be filed with other boards in November, it was announced.

Colonel Edgar H. Bain, of Goldsboro, State Director in charge of the beer industry's labor in the enforcement of the "clean up or close up" campaign in North Carolina, filed petitions requesting the revocation of three licenses in Buncombe, three in New Hanover, two in Gaston, and one in Brunswick county.
