## Funeral Tuesday Mount Pleasant For A.F. Eshelman Beats Local Team

### Last Rites Held In High Point For Father Of P. W. Eshelman

Funeral service was held Tuesday afternoon in High Point for Alfred F. Eshelman, 81, pioneer citizen, at the home of a son, J. A. Eshelman, where he died on Monday morning. He was the father of P. W. Eshelman, president of Wilkes Hosiery Mills, Inc., in this city.

The last rites were conducted by Dr. A. B. Conrad, pastor of the High Point First Baptist church, and Dr. E. H. Blackard, pastor of Wesley Memorial Methodist church in High Point. Burial in Oakwood cemetery.

He was born April 11, 1858, in Fredericksburg, Pa., and was a graduate of Lebanon Valley College, Annville, Pa. For several years after his graduation he taught school. A great lover of the classics, he possessed a large and well-selected library, including some rare old volumes.

He was twice married. His first wife was Maria Catherine Ward, who died in 1906. His second wife was Mrs. Mattie Caddell Brooks of Carthage. Mr. Eshelman and his first wife were close friends of the late Dr. John Franklin Crowell, second president of Trinity College, and it was he who persuaded the Eshelman family to remove from Lebanon, Pa., to Trinity. In 1896, after the college was moved to Durham, the Eshelmans moved to High Point.

Mr. Eshelman served for eight years as assistant postmaster at High Point. Later for several years he was in the insurance business. Of recent years he had spent most of his time at his home on South Main street in High Point, gardening and reading the classics. Since December, 1939, Mr. and Mrs. Eshelman had lived with Mr. Eshelman's son, J. A. Eshelman.

Surviving are the widow; two daughters, Dr. Lucy M. Eshelman of High Point, and Mrs. William Cox of Hickory; two sons, P. W. Eshelman of North Wilkesboro, and J. A. Eshelman, of High Point, and six grandchildren.

Among those from here attending the funeral service in addition to Mr. Eshelman and family were P. J. Brame, Watson Brame, J. C. Reins and the office personnel of Wilkes Hosiery Mills.
