

### Beer Dealers In Wilkes County

Raleigh.—The State Department of Revenue issued 4,934 retail beer licenses for the 1939-40 year ended April 30, and it is expected that 5,000 individuals and firms will purchase licenses during the next 12 months.

The state issued 29 retail beer licenses for Wilkes county last year as compared with 31 for the 1938-39 tax year, according to the Brewers and North Carolina Beer Distributors Committee.

Moeklenburg county's 335 led the state for the year just ended. Guilford came next with 254, followed by Forsyth with 216. Buncombe 191, Wake 18, New Hanover 162, Durham 157, Rowan

During the past year, the retail beer licenses of 86 dealers in 31 counties have been revoked by the courts and local governing bodies. Of this number 78 were revoked on petition of the Brewers and North Carolina Beer Distributors Committee as a part of its "clean up or close up" campaign to purge the industry of undesirable beer outlets.

### State College Answers Timely Farm Question

Question: How much skim milk may be substituted for other ingredients in poultry feeds?

Answer: Skim milk, clabber, or buttermilk may be substituted for all dried milk products, one-half of the fish meal, and one-half of the meat meal recommended for the poultry ration.

When the substitution is made for these amounts, three gallons of the skim milk or other products should be fed per day to each 100 hens. The success of these substitutions will depend upon the regularity with which the milk is fed. Unless there is an ample supply available at all times no substitutions should be made.

### Drive to Carry State For FDR

Raleigh.—An intensive drive to put North Carolina safely and enthusiastically in the Franklin D. Roosevelt column at the Democratic national convention is in full swing this week, under direction of the "North Carolina for Roosevelt" organization with headquarters in Raleigh.

Active organization workers took the field Monday in every district after the FDR resolutions proposed for every county convention had received the "approval" of Governor Clyde R. Hoey who issued a statement saying he would support them in the state convention here May 18.

The resolutions call upon the state convention to send to the national convention a full delegation instructed to support President Roosevelt for re-nomination as long as his name is before the convention.

Governor Hoey's statement of "approval" removed the last possibility of a bitter fight in the county and state conventions over the national convention delegation. Former State Senator John Folger said he was "delighted" with the Governor's action and praised it as "just what was to be expected from the great Democrat he is."

The "North Carolina for Roosevelt" organization professes to have no second choice for the Democratic presidential nomination. Its only objective, Chairman Folger says, is to prove conclusively the loyalty of North Carolina to Roosevelt and his Administration. Prior to his "approval" of the Roosevelt resolutions Governor Hoey had come out for Secretary of State Cordell Hull for the Democratic nomination.

### Distinctive Uniforms Worn, 4-H Members

Wider use of the distinctive 4-H Club uniforms is being urged by L. R. Harrill, 4-H Club leader of State College. All members attending the annual 4-H Short Course at State College July 22-27 will be required to wear uniforms.

Miss Willie N. Hunter, Extension clothing specialist, and her assistant, Miss Julia McIver, have designed the North Carolina 4-H uniforms, which are of the same general style as used in all other States.

The Girl's uniform consists of green broadcloth, with white collar and facing, green thread, white simulated patent leather belt, slide fasteners, and white pearl buttons for cufflinks. A white hat and a pair of comfortable, white walking shoes complete the outfit.

The boys' uniform is a white shirt, white duck trousers, black shoes, black tie, and black belt.

Many girls make their uniforms as a part of a clothing project, although this is not a requirement.

Harrill insisted that 4-H members wear their uniforms at outstanding events. The calendar of club events for 1940 starts with leaders' training schools at the Millstone 4-H Camp May 7-11, at a place in Eastern North Carolina yet to be designated May 14-18, and at the Swannanoa 4-H Camp May 21-24.

The State Older Youth Conference will be held at State College June 4-8, and the National 4-H Camp is scheduled in Washington, D. C., June 12-19. Following the short course, the Wildlife Conservation Conference will be held August 27-31, and the State Dress Review at State College on October 4. The State Fair, in which 4-H members participate, will be held this year October 8-12.

### Shelton Canter Election Winner At Wake Forest

Shelton Canter, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Canter of North Wilkesboro, was victorious in Wake Forest College elections last week, winning a place as sophomore representative in the college student legislature.

Canter, who is a freshman at Wake Forest, entered the political race on April 12. He ran against John Conley, of West Hartford, Conn., and Hammond Floyd, of Barnesville. Canter placed first in the first primaries, but his majority was not large enough to prevent a run-off.

In the run-off election held last week, he won the contest from Conley by a twenty-majority vote. He will be invested in office on Thursday, May 2, although his duties as legislator will not begin until September.

The student legislature, of which Canter is now a member, has as its duties the passing of all laws, rules and customs relating to student government. It also reports violations of these rulings to the student body.
