But Here Are The Facts!

On Monday, Feb. 14, 1927, a mass meeting of Wilkes citizens was held in the courthouse to discuss advisability of issuing \$150,000 in road bonds. By a ratio of about 3 to 2 the meeting went on record favoring the issue.

While not making an address for or against the bond issue, A. B. Johnston, chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, pointed out there was a deficit in the school board of around \$40,000, and that it would be necessary to raise the tax rate at least 15 cents on the \$100 valuation for the next five years.

J. G. Brewer made the motion that a vote be taken and it resulted in a victory for the road boosters by a ratio of 3 to 2.

Upon motion, J. A. Rousseau and A. H. Casey were appointed to draft the bill. The bill was drawn by F. B. Hendren, attorney for Wilkes County Road Commission.

FLOYD C. FORESTER MADE A MOTION, WHICH WAS SECONDED BY A. C. DENNIS, TO INCLUDE A DIRECT VOTE OF THE PEOPLE, BUT THE CHAIRMAN RULED THE MOTION OUT OF ORDER AND IT WAS NOT PLACED BEFORE THIS MASS MEETING. THE BILL WAS THEN CARRIED TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY IN RALEIGH.

Tom Forester then went to Raleigh and at his own expense worked against the bill for six weeks. The bill was passed favorably, against Tom Forester's protests, in committee as being a Local Bill. Those attending the hearing first from Wilkes County were L. Bumgarner, F. C. Forester, P. E. Dancy, L. A. Harris, F. M. Shepherd, D. F. Shepherd, A. Caudill, Dr. T. H. Higgins, F. B. Hendren, C. D. Holbrook, T. S. Bryan, E. R. Settle, Delos Holbrook, C. C. McCann, Ex-Sheriff J. H. Johnson, R. G. Foster, and Julius C. Hubbard. Other citizens in Raleigh who did not attend the committee hearing were H. A. Cranor, Julius A. Rousseau, and D. J. Brookshire. Tom Forester, after being defeated in all committee hearings, started home, but arriving in Winston-Salem, he wired LeRoy Martin, Chief Clerk of the Senate, and again protested against the bill. Tom Forester was called back to Raleigh by Senator John Hargett, and then he contacted Wilkins P. Horton, now candidate for Governor, and W. Banks Horton, of Caswell County, and persuaded them to offer an amendment to the bill calling for a vote of Wilkes County citizens on the issue in line with his motion in the original mass meeting. When these amendments were offerd and passed, proponents of the bill withdrew their support and the measure was killed.
