Roosevelt and work to the end that the better prices now enjoyed by our Farmers and fairer wages and hours that have been given to the American Working Man are made secure. During these days when all the talk is about War I am thinking about our own folks and to the end that their interests are protected and not forgotten.
9. I shall never take any stand or make any representation in an effort to try and mislead the good people of my District.
