Lee Church, 15, Drowns In Yadkin

Boonville.—Lee Church, 15, son of G. H. Church, Hazel Hill road, Winston-Salem, drowned in the Yadkin River, at the new Gratefield bridge Thursday afternoon about 12:30 o'clock.

The body was recovered by Prather Stanley of Surry county. About 100 men searched the river throughout the afternoon in several row boats, and motor boats before the body was located about 400 yards from the point where church went down for the last time.

One of the workmen dropped one of his tools into the river. Church had retrieved a tool several days ago from the same place in the river by wading out into the water, which was shallow and calm at that time.

Church went after the tool. The river was swift and after wading a short distance, Church found he could not reach the point without swimming. He is said to have told one of the workmen he could swim and started after the object. He went down in six feet of water where the current was strong.

The boy was drowned before anyone could reach him.

Surviving are the father; three sisters, Mrs. Virginia Miller, Ruby and Margaret Church, all of North Wilkesboro and one brother, Zollie Church.

He was a nephew of W. J. and Turner Church, of this city, Mrs. Ruby Church and Mrs. Claude Miller, of Cricket, and a grandson of Mrs. Martha Church, of Cricket.

Iredell Farmer Killed By Car Near His Home

Statesville.—Shirley William Moore, 40, North Iredell farmer, was instantly killed by an automobile while walking on the highway near his home late Saturday night.

Following an inquest conducted by Coroner N. D. Tomlin Sunday, Ralph Lambert, 19, was ordered held on manslaughter charge in connection with the death and Hubert Beaver, 21, was held as a material witness. The evidence indicated that Moore was walking on the left shoulder of the Wilkesboro highway near Lanford filling station, 21 miles north of Statesville. Lambert, driving on the left side of the paved road, struck Moore in the back and left his mangled body by the roadside as he kept going.

Later Lambert was apprehended at a station a mile further north. Hubert Beaver was riding with Lambert.
