

Loan Application For Farm Is O.K'd

J. S. Pardue Boys 103-Acre Farm Through Provisions Of FSA

Another Wilkes county farm fully is now living on its own feet—a new graduate from tenancy into farm ownership.

J. S. Pardue, of the Roaring River community, has received approval from Farm Security administration of a loan for the purchase of 103 acres of the Lambeth farm.

J. B. Highsmith, FSA supervisor for Wilkes county, announced approval of the loan this week and said the deal would be closed as soon as necessary papers are completed. A number of improvements will be made on the farm, including new barn, poultry house, new smokehouse, new privy, water supply and corn crib.

The loan for the purchase of Mr. Pardue's new farm home will come out of funds loaned by the Farm Security Administration by the RFC under terms of the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Purchase act, the purpose of which is to make it possible for distressed farm tenants and farm workers to buy family-sized farms. The loan may be repaid over a period of 40 years with interest at three per cent.

A plan for operation of the farm, designed to provide adequate and healthful living for the family and the conservation of soil and water resources, is being worked out by Mr. Pardue and Supervisor Highsmith. This is the fifteenth loan approved for Wilkes county under the tenant purchase program.

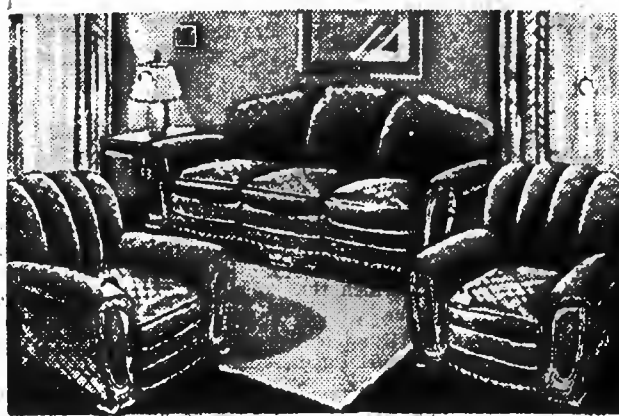
