Hatch Claims Party Evades Politics Laws

Washington. — Senator Hatch (D), N. M., charged his own party yesterday with evading the politics laws and demanded that it abandon its "convention books" carrying advertising from corporations.

He contended that any purchase of the book would violate the Hatch act. As for its advertising the senator conceded that the solicitation before the Hatch law was enacted probably was technically legal but held that it was "clearly an evasion if not a violation of the corrupt practices act" which forbids corporations to make political contributions.

"There is just one thing to do about this convention book," Hatch told the Senate. "Regardless of what the cost may be or what effect it may have, it should be discontinued right now."

"As I said last week to the Republican national committee, 'obey the spirit as well as the letter of the law,' so I say this week to the Democratic national committee, 'obey the spirit as well as the letter of the law.'"

Last Monday Hatch criticized an interpretation of the Hatch act's restrictions on political contributions and expenditures made by Henry P. Fletcher, general counsel of the Republican national committee, contending that it was designed to circumvent the law.

"I think the things that my own national committee is doing today or proposing to do with the publication and sale of the convention book," Hatch declared, "amounts just as much to an evasion of the law, an evasion of the principle and purpose, as the plan that Mr. Fletcher conceived and which I denounced last week."

"I do not apply a rule to the Republican party which I do not also apply to the Democratic party."

Brave Women Asset In Nation

There's a stirring story in the annals of almost every old American family concerning some brave ancestor, as a woman who rose to great heights of power at some crisis in the family's history.

Perhaps she was the wife of some early New England colonist who defended her home against the Indians during her husband's absence. Perhaps she went West in a covered wagon and worked as hard as any of her menfolk proving up on the "Claim" given them by the government. Perhaps she was one of the early school teachers who maintained standards of decency in a remote mining community by her own staunch belief in the amenities of life. Perhaps she took over the management of the farm and kept it producing during the years that her husband was at war.

In this country we are rich in the legends of great women who stood shoulder to shoulder with their husbands in the settlement and development of the country. But during the last two generations women as a whole have been more served than serving of their country! This was largely due to the effects of American industry which freed women from household drudgery by producing a host of household conveniences and brought her new opportunities for entertainment by the development of the automobile, the moving picture and the radio. It was all very pleasant and easy and we took to our new way of life with enthusiasm and believed that the great days when women could be of use to this country were all in the past.

But today once more it is necessary for the women of this country to take their places beside the men if the freedom we have hitherto taken for granted is to be maintained for ourselves and for our children. This time we are not required to fight or till the soil or carry the banner of civilization into some remote outpost but to help to create the most powerful of all weapons in a Democracy—public opinion.

We must realize clearly what it is that gives us our unique privileges in this country as women and as human beings and through personal conversation, as well as club study and civic meetings, help to build up the needed bulwark of opinion in favor of those three national traditions which are the backbone of our Freedom—representative democracy... civil and religious liberties, and free business enterprise.

Women in the past have risen to the occasion in every national emergency. Isn't there every reason to believe that the women of today care as much what happens to their country and will be willing to do their part in saving it from the tyranny whose shadow lies over the rest of the world?

Invasion Step Expected Soon

Bern, Switzerland. — Foreign military attaches in Switzerland, the last neutral "window" left in western Europe, generally agreed today that an attempted German blitzkrieg on Britain may come any time within the next 72 hours.

They saw in today's air raids against Dover and the German claim of air control over the point where the English Channel is narrowest the long-expected move against the part of Britain most exposed to German long-range guns.

Reports that could not be confirmed here were current in these quarters that 40-mile German guns around Calais and Dunkirk already had begun laying down a barrage behind Dover.

Although neutral observers took both London and Berlin communique describing their respective losses with much salt, they said the Germans now have reached the peak of their preparation for attacks against Portsmouth and Dover.

The next move expected here is a mass attack by dive bombers on Britain's main military airports and emergency landing fields.

This attack, they said, was to be expected "a few hours before" or possibly simultaneous with the first fast movement of mine-sweepers, quickly followed by the shuffling of troop transports across the channel guarded by speedboats and submarines.

Over the last week-end, the odds of Britain's chances of defending herself successfully against a mid-August offensive dropped again here to 50-50. Previous 60-40 odds were based on Germany's delay in launching an offensive.

Information reaching foreign observers in Switzerland indicated that, while British R. A. F. bombing was more accurate than the German, it had little effect on widespread Nazi invasion preparations.

COTTON

Show Cattle Need Careful Attention

The farmer whose animals win blue ribbons at state fairs is the one who has seen that no detail has been overlooked in showing them to the best possible advantage, says L. L. Case, extension animal husbandman of State College.

The first step in feeding and fitting beef cattle for the show or sale ring is the actual selection of suitable animals. Little will be gained by wasting feed and time on off-type cattle that will never make a favorable appearance no matter how fat or how well trained they may become.

The ideal beef animal, Case explained, is one that is thick, blocky, and reasonably close to the ground. He should be straight in his top, bottom, and side lines, carry an even width from end to end, and be close in the coupling.

The animal should show evidence of good quality as indicated by a pliable hide, a soft silky coat of hair, neatness in the bone, and smoothness in the flesh covering. In temperament, the animal should be reasonably quiet and docile, yet with enough life and style to give him an attractive carriage.

No matter how good a beef animal is as an individual, he will not show to advantage unless he is in top condition. This makes it necessary that cattle be started early enough to assure a good finish at fair or sale time. By

feeding three times a day rather than twice, a greater total consumption of food will be induced. The residue of the ration should be kept warm.

The importance of having an animal well-broken and trained so that it will lead and stand cannot be overemphasized, Case said. Constant washing and brushing also occupy an important place in the grooming program.

A careful check of cotton fields in all sections of Hatteras county reveals an excellent crop with practically no boll weevil infestations, reports Farm Agent W. O. Davis
