Uses Of Italian Rye Grass Explained

Italian Rye Grass is now available to farmers save Gram of Aid.

For the past few years, thousands of farmers have been using Italian rye grass for a green cover crop and they are very like it. Italian rye grass makes good grazing for the winter months. It may be seeded alone or seeded on a permanent pasture. Where it is seeded on a permanent pasture a narrow should be used to scratch the sod.

It may be used as the lawn mixture to give a green lawn the first winter.

When seeded alone — 12 pounds of seed should be applied per acre while 10 pounds per acre will be sufficient for seeding on a pasture.

Italian Rye Grass has a wonderful root system and therefore, is very valuable in helping to control erosion in the winter months.
