> The counties are: Ashe, Avery wood, Jackson, McDowell, Martin, Northampton, Polk, Ruther ford, Swain, Watauga, Wilkes, Yadkiu and Yancey. Five other counties were affected by floods, but will not be covered by the provision either because their damage was slight or because the mattress program is not n effect there.

> Many families have been left almost destitute in the wake of these floods. Miss Current said. Household belongings as well as crops, livestock, and feed on hand were swept away or ruined by

By supplying the affected lowncomes families with free matresses, and giving them other possible aid, it is hoped they will ecover from the floods' ravages much sooner, the State College home demonstration leader said.

Miss Current also reported that the mattress-making program for the State as a whole is now turning out more than 1,000 finished mattresses a week. Families who are to receive these mattresses assist in the making, supervised by home agents of the Extension Service or trained voluntary

Too Few Nails Often Used In

In the erection of farm buildings, poor nailing of joints is often the cause of later damage to these buildings by windstorms. Skimping of the number of nails often means increased upkeep costs, says the U.S. Forest Products Laboratory, Madison, Wisconsin.

A poor job of nailing in the construction or repair of farm buildings and the use of too few or too small nails result in weaknesses at the joints. Many farm buildings are blown down or sag because not enough or tooksmall nails were used in their construction and while small nails do not crack the lumber so much as larger ones, they are not so effective in holding the building

Good nailing practice consists mainly in using the proper kind, tize, and number of nails for each particular part of a wooden structure. In order to get the full strength of the commonwire nail under a sidoways pull, it must be driven at least two-thirds of its Tength into the piece receiving the point if light-weight wood is heing nailed. When it is not possible to get this much penetration, more nails should be used because the strength increases directly with the number of nails.
