## Guard May Stay On Longer Duty

Washington, Oct. 22.—Belief that mobilized units of the national guard would be held on active duty beyond their projected year of Federal service was expressed today by Major General Milton A. Reckord, Maryland State adjutant general. Speaking at the National Guard association's convention, Reckord also declared that unless the new draft law is amended to protect the guard's traditional Federal-State status, it would be reduced to a home-defense force. He said he believed that if the guard were released from Federal service at the end of the year's training, its function as a manpower reserve for the regular army ultimately would be taken over by the trainees from the draft program.

### Predicts Confusion

Reckord predicted "confusion" in the guard's status.

would result if the guard were demobilized at the end of its year of duty because its ranks would include many draftees whose training had not been completed. "It almost makes you think that they do not expect us to come home at the end of the year," he said, referring to the War department. "At least, that's how I feel."

Reckord asserted that if the guard wished to maintain its place in the nation's military organization, it would have to work out a plan to insure that the guard's peacetime efficiency would be greater than at present and to provide for a flow of qualified junior officers into the guard.

As a long-range solution, Reckord suggested that the draft law should be amended to permit the training of younger men and that all voluntary training in the national guard should be discontinued. In its place, he suggested that the guard be kept up to strength by increments of draftees who complete their year of service but desire to take advantage of the provision permitting them to substitute two years of service in the national guard for nine years of availability in an inactive reserve status.

## Several Democrats Join Willkie Move

Greensboro.—With less than two weeks remaining until election, leading North Carolina Democrats are joining the swing to the Democrats-for Willkie movement in the State, according to J.
