October 16 Are Required To Register That Day Every man in Wilkes county, who has attained the 21st anniversary of the day of his birth stice October 16, 1940 (with few exceptions noted below), must regiser with his local Selective board

Men Who Become 21 Since

on July 1, 1941. Men required to register in this second registration are those who vere born on or between October 17, 1919, and July 1, 1920.

Aliens, as well as American citizens, who become 21 years of age before midnight July 1, 1941, must register. Also aliens between the ages of 21 and 36 years who have come to the United States since the first registration on October 16, 1940 and who have not yet registered, must register on July 1, 1941. If there are any men I quired to

register who cannot appear before the local board because of illness or incapacity, they will please notify the local board in writing immediately setting forth the reasons why they could not appear and some arrangement will be made for their registration, or if any men required to register are unable to appear before the local board or to notify the local board because of illness or incapacity, their nearest relative, friend or neighbor is requested to notify the round the Kissler family.
