to Fight Japa 14 More Years

Changking, China.-Quo Ohl, Chinese foreign minister, mid in a broadcast to the United States today that China was prepared to fight for four or 14 more years to win war against Japan. Speaking on the fourth anniversary of the Japanese attack on China, Quo said that China was fully prepared to fight on not only for the next four years but for the 14 years if that is necessary to win a final victory.

China was confident, he said, because of intreased American aid. He expressed the nation's gratitude to the United States.

Twenty-seven Japanese planes heavily bombed the capital last night. They plastered the suburba and the government area with incendiary bombs which started numerous fires. The glow lighted the city luridly.
