Elusive Everett Wiles In Jail At Statesville

said he had never met stiffer opposition in a law suit and that Wiles, who showed considerable knowledge of the law, fought verbally over every point and every bit of testimony. His cross examination of the prosecuting witnesses, McDuffie said, was terrific and nothing short of sensational.

Often McDuffie and Wiles would stand before the two magistrates and argue some point vehemently. McDuffie said all the time he wondered why the magistrates were so quiet and were so reluctant to rule on various points.

The trial ran its course and the magistrates after whispered consultation announced that after deliberation they would let the interested parties know their decision. McDuffie did not understand a procedure like that, in view of the fact that he considered the prosecution had put forth a strong case against the two Wiles boys.

McDuffie said to this day he has never learned the outcome of that case over ten years ago.

After the trial one of the spectators told McDuffie that it would have been exceedingly reckless for the magistrates to have announced a decision there against Wiles. McDuffie was also informed that Wiles at the trial was carrying a gun "half as long as your arm." McDuffie said that he will not soon forget that case. After he learned the circumstances and reflected on the vigor with which he prosecuted Wiles, he said it was no wonder that the schoolhouse full of people looked on him with amazement.

Officers described Wiles as being an exceptionally daring and shrewd desperado. Secret service agent who trailed Wiles said he knew of no other counterfeiter who had a record as long as his in passing spurious bills. Wiles was trailed over six states with the officers being in most instances about two days behind.

Hitler Planned Iceland Attack, Source Reports

Washington.—President Roosevelt took over the military protection of Iceland after reports reached him that the German general staff was considering attacking it to obtain a base from which to control North Atlantic shipping lanes, a usually well informed congressional source said today.

United States naval forces were gradually supplanting a British garrison defending the Independent Island Republic which is 180 miles from Greenland, 800 miles from the Norwegian wing of Germany's war front, and 2,500 miles from New York. It was a partial fulfillment of President Roosevelt's fears that all the Atlantic outposts of the Western Hemisphere, including the Azores and the Cape Verde Islands, would have to be taken over as defensive measures.

The report of German plans said to have reached Mr. Roosevelt said also that the Germans planned another strong base at Dakar, French West Africa, and from it and Iceland hoped to sink or capture 80 per cent of the Atlantic shipping en route to Egypt and the British Isles.

There was no indication here nor is it believed likely, that the United States would attempt to put a protective force at Dakar. One reason advanced by Mr. Roosevelt for taking over in Iceland was that German occupation of the island would be a "threat against the steady flow of munitions to Great Britain—which is a matter of broad policy clearly approved by Congress."
