The camera probably can't tell the difference and the chances are that the actors can't, either, but just the same they went all out on realism over at the Edward Small lot where Ilona Massey, George Brent and Basil Rathbone were appearing in a spy tale called, "International Lady," which starts a run at the Liberty Theatre on Monday and Tuesday.
