Washington, Nov. 10. - The Agriculture department reported today that this year's corn crop is 2,675,373,000 bushels, based on November 1, conditions.

Corn production was forecast at 2.625.502,000 bushels a month ago. Production was 2,440,200,-000 bushels last year, and the 1930-39 average was 2,307,452,-000 bushels.

The crop reporting board made no change in its preliminary es. culture. timate of a month ago on this year's wheat crop placed at 961,-
