London.—Women of the Auxiliary Territorial service—like their counterpart in Russia—are taking a more and more active part in the war. In ever increasing proportions, they are working with—and in many cases even replacing—the men of Britain in active war work. As recently revealed in the House of Commons, Britain does not intend to increase the number of divisions that today make up her army.

Expand Groups

New call-ups, foreign volunteers will be sent into already established regiments and organizations—which will be thus expanded, but not increased in the number.

For this reason, as well as because of the growing shortage of man power on these islands, women are taking over more and more of the so-called "men's jobs."

Especially in the Royal Artillery is their activity and responsibility increasing. They are now being trained as anti-aircraft gunners.

Aid In Work
Women are already engaged on much of the work of anti-aircraft defense, but have no, up to the present, taken entire charge of gun pits.
