

Cancer Leads In Death Causes, Rousseau Says

High Point.—It is cancer more than tuberculosis or circulatory diseases which is the leading single cause of death in the civilized countries, Dr. J. P. Rousseau of Winston-Salem told the High Point Rotary club at its luncheon meeting at the Sheraton hotel here Thursday.

Despite the fact that knowledge of cancer is continually increasing, the mortality rate from this disease is increasing also, the speaker declared. On the other hand, tens of thousands of cancer patients are cured annually, and Dr. Rousseau expressed the opinion that this number could be greatly increased if those who suffered from the disease submitted themselves to careful attention from their physicians in the early stages of the trouble.

The Winston-Salem physician

also described early symptoms of malignant growths in various parts of the human body. The public, he declared, has done almost nothing about cancer, but "his might reasonably be expected, he added, since the skill of a qualified physician frequently does not enable the possessor of such skill to make a positive diagnosis until very intensive examinations and tests have been made.

Curative measures which have been found most effective in the treatment he listed as surgery, X-ray and radium, but no treatment is highly effective unless the disease is discovered in its early stages, he concluded.

Home Seekers Are Urged To Send For Book

Washington.—Small home seekers are urged to take advantage of architectural and technical services to protect their investments, "which often represent the savings of a lifetime," in a new booklet published under the sponsorship of the Federal Home Loan Bank Board and entitled, "If You Plan to Build or Buy a Home."

To the laymen, the booklet addresses the message:

"If you know a poor cement mix when you see it . . . if you know when wood is properly protected and when it's exposed . . . if your eagle eye can detect improper joints, poor soldering, defective wiring, small cracks, loose nails and poor grade lumber . . . if you know all about weatherproofing, termites, good ventilation and a hundred little items of home building—then perhaps you can afford to neglect technical advice.

"Otherwise it's a very wise precaution for the most important investment of your life."

The booklet points out that home seekers now are able to obtain the most liberal, long-term loans, with the lowest home mortgage interest rates, in the nation's history—and that homes can be paid for as conveniently as they can be rented. But it stresses chiefly the fact that attractive designs and supervision of construction now are offered by the most progressive home-financing agencies and urges the public to apply for those services.

The emphasis laid on low-cost homes under the defense housing program adds to, rather than detracts from, the importance of the booklet, Bank Board officials point out. Architectural services always have been available on higher-cost homes but the Bank Board hopes to broaden their use in the small home field.

In addition to being available from the Bank Board in Washington, "If You Plan to Build or Buy a Home" is being reproduced by many savings and loans associations throughout the country. The Bank Board directs the Federal Home Loan Bank system, which provides a home mortgage credit reserve for some 3850 thrift and home-financing institutions, with assets of more than \$5,300,000,000.

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N.Y.A. Program To Be Curtailed

Raleigh, Nov. 25.—A curtailment of the N.Y.A. program in North Carolina as a result of cuts made by the Federal Bureau of the Budget in national N.Y.A. appropriations previously approved by Congress was announced here today by State N.Y.A. Administrator John A. Lang.

"The reductions involve \$29,400,000 in N.Y.A. appropriations for the nation and will result in the curtailment of the N.Y.A. program in this state by approximately 25 per cent," he said.

"At the present time the N.Y.A. is providing work experience and training for 10,001 young men and women in North Carolina. Due to the decrease in funds available for N.Y.A. activities in the state, this figure will be reduced by 2,283 to 7,718 youths. This will include a reduction from 8,251 youths employed in the regular out-of-school work to 5,250 and a like reduction in the present defense training enrollment from 1,750 to 1,463.

"The student work program is being reduced by more than one-

third," Lang pointed out, "being hit particularly hard by this re-arrangement action. Reductions will be made from the present enrollment of 11,135 students being assisted in continuing their education in high schools and colleges of North Carolina to 5,770. The number of college students to be aided will be reduced from 3,010 to 2,149, a reduction of 861 young people or 28.6 per cent. The high school enrollment is being reduced from 8,125 to 3,982, a reduction of 4,143 young people of 51 per cent.

"These cuts in our budget for the remainder of 1941-42 obviously require major adjustments in the N.Y.A. programs of North Carolina," Lang declared. "Before any project may be continued in the state, it will be carefully considered by this office at the end of each pay period as to its need and usefulness. Each project will also be reviewed, as to its service in the light of the national emergency."

"Naturally this curtailment will eliminate many projects ordinarily deemed worthwhile and will result in a reduction of supervisory personnel accordingly. Area offices in the state will be reduced from the present nine located in Washington, Henderson, Kin-

"Among the N.Y.A. projects first to be eliminated will be repairs to public buildings, mattress making, clerical service, home service, hospital attendants, and similar types of work. On the other hand, types of work vital to national defense 'raining and production of equipment for military posts, such as machine shops, welding, sheet metal work, radio operation and ships carpentry will be stressed and further developed wherever funds permit. It is anticipated that no new construction projects can be undertaken by the N.Y.A. for several months."

Arrested by the Gestapo in Germany and convicted on high treason against the Hitler regime, Valtin, as he is popularly known, fled to this country and wrote his book, which purports to expose Communism and Nazi activities.

Records showed that he pleaded guilty to a charge of assault with a deadly weapon upon Maurice L. Goodstein, 67-year old merchant, and was sentenced to 10 years in the San Quentin prison; that he was paroled after serving approximately three years, and one month and was deported to Germany, December 9, 1939.

He was alleged to have entered the country illegally by "jumping ship" at Norfolk, Va., March 6, 1938.

Department of Justice officials said the author has admitted joining the Communist party in 1923, but contended he quit in 1937.
