and W. A. Stroud. The following only missed two meetings: A. H. Casey, Gordon Finley, J. R. Hix, and J. C. Reins.  
The report further indicated that special effort has been made to keep citizenship ideals before the club and the community. The Public Affairs committee has wrought well, having been successful in securing the Coble Dairy plant for the community and with such work done toward making an impressive request to Congress to build a flood control dam on the Yadkin River here.

The Agriculture committee has made an impressive record. It has endeavored to bring the rural and town people into finer relationships. Its projects supported by the club and in cooperation with the Farm Demonstration agent have resulted well.

The Under Privileged Child committee has continued its fine piece of work. There have been 313 physical examinations made of crippled people during the year by an Orthopedic surgeon. Sixty-seven or more of these have been hospitalized and corrected. This committee has expended \$368.00 for this work.

President Carter thanked the club members for their fine support during the year and expressed appreciation for the achievements that have been wrought by the various committees. He then pinned the president's button on President-elect J. Bid Williams and presented him with the gavel.

A. H. Casey, past lieutenant governor, was called forward and he presented Kiwanian Carter with the past president's button. President Williams then asked the club to continue to give him the fine support that its members have given during the past year. The secretary read the list of committees and the membership of each.

Indicative of the patriotism among the members of the club is this preface of the annual report of the secretary read at the meeting Friday:
