Public Assistance Total Is \$9.093.96

Needy Aged, 309 Dependent Children and 46 Blind Aided Last Month

A total of \$9,093.96 was paid from the Wilkes welfare office in nublic assistance and general relief funds during the month of December, according to figures re-

leased today. More than half the total went in regular monthly grants to 703 needy aged, the amount being \$5,-918.50. Aid to dependent children funds totaling \$2,152.50 went to 162 families with 309 children. Forty-six blind received grants totaling \$587. General relief and other direct aid expenditures totaled \$435.96.
