## German Planes Fail To Excite Our Doughboys

With the United States Armed Forces in Northern Ireland.—Unperturbed by the fact that German planes already have been sighted over Northern Ireland, American troops fresh from the United States camps buckled down under combat conditions, prepared for anything Thursday.

Scattered through 5,000 square miles of Ulster, they settled into camps prepared for them by British soldiers, marched out the links of their transatlantic journey and concentrated on drills to protect themselves against German bombers and parachute troops.

## Surprises Ran Out

"We are not surprised at anything any more," a group told me as I stood with them in the center of their camp on a hillside.

They were encamped among the of what formerly was an Irish estate.

"We have traveled 6,000 miles in the last month and a half, and surprises have run out," they said. "From here on we are ready to fight and get the thing over with quickly."

## Churchill Wins 464-to-1 Vote Of Confidence

London.—Prime Minister Winston Churchill won a 464-to-1 vote of confidence from the House of Commons after asserting that although there had been mistakes in his far eastern policy, the arrival of American troops in the British Isles would release vast stores of arms to allied forces in the Pacific.

He said the landing of U. S. troops in North Ireland meets American wishes "that the large mass of trained and equipped troops they have in the United States should come in contact with the enemy as close and as soon as possible."

## Will Flow Elsewhere

"The fact that the United States has been able to send well-equipped divisions to Britain so easily and so rapidly will enable substantial supplies of munitions and weapons held to Britain's account in the United States to be sent to Australia and New Zealand," he said.

With this word of promise Churchill survived the worst government crisis of his wartime career.
