

A Proclamation By The Governor On Registration

Third Registration Day On Monday, Feb. 16, 1942, 7:00 To 9:00 P. M.

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WHEREAS, the Selective Training and Service Act of 1940 approved September 16, 1940, has been amended to provide for the extension of liability for military service and for the registration of additional age groups; and WHEREAS, the President of the United States approved this on December 20, 1941, and in compliance with its provisions, has proclaimed

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 16, 1942, as the day upon which the third registration shall be held; and WHEREAS, it becomes the duty of the Governors of the several States, in accordance with the Act of Congress and under the Proclamation issued by the President of the United States, to do and perform all acts and services necessary to accomplish the effective and complete registration of all those required to register on the third registration day:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, J. MELVILLE BROUGHTON, Governor of the State of North Carolina, in pursuance of the authority conferred upon me in the Selective Training and Service Act of 1940, as amended on December 20, 1941, and in the Proclamation of the President of the United States, and by virtue of the power vested in me as Governor of the State of North Carolina, do proclaim the following:

1. That Monday, February 16, 1942, is hereby designated a **THIRD REGISTRATION DAY.** All registration places in North Carolina shall remain open from 7:00 A. M. to 9:00 P. M. on said date.

2. That the several local Selective Service boards in North Carolina are hereby designated as the officials charged with the responsibility of conducting this registration and are hereby directed to provide all necessary facilities for the registration of those men required to register in their respective local board areas.

3. That every male citizen of the United States residing in North Carolina and every male alien residing in the State (other than persons excepted by Section 5 (a) of the Selective Training and Service Act of 1940, as amended, and by Section 208 of the Coast Guard Artillery and Reserve Act of 1941) who, on December 31, 1941, has attained the twentieth anniversary of the day of his birth and who, on February 16, 1942, has not attained the forty-fifth anniversary of the day of his birth, and has not heretofore been registered under the Selective Training and Service Act of 1940 and the regulations promulgated pursuant thereto, is required to present himself for and submit to registration at his duly designated registration place between the hours of 7:00 A. M. and 9:00 P. M. on February 16, 1942.

4. That persons subject to this registration shall register at the place duly designated by the local board having jurisdiction over the area of their permanent residence. If a person required to register is on registration day so far removed from the place of his residence that he cannot without great inconvenience return to his home to register, he is authorized to present himself for and submit to registration at the most convenient registration place. Special provision will be made for the registration of those who, on account of sickness or other causes beyond their control, are unable to present themselves at the regularly designated registration places on registration day.

5. That persons who, on account of circumstances beyond their control, are unable to present themselves and submit to registration on this third registration day, may be registered after February 16, 1942, but such registration must be accomplished as soon as possible after the cause of such inability ceases to exist.

6. That this third registration shall be in accordance with the Selective Service Regulations. Every person subject to registration is required to familiarize himself with such regulations and to comply therewith. Penalties are provided for those who neglect or refuse to register.

I call upon all employers of labor, all educational institutions, and the heads of all government agencies in this state to give those under their charge sufficient time to enable them to discharge the duty of registering. And I call upon all State, county and municipal agencies to give full cooperation to those charged with the duty of conducting the

registration, to the end that the registration in North Carolina may be successful in every respect.

A state of war now exists between the United States and Japan, Germany and Italy. In order to fight this war to a successful conclusion, the Congress has decided that it is necessary to register the manpower of the nation and thereafter induct men into military service, in accordance with a fair and just system of selection. Registration is the first step toward selection. I feel that those of our citizens who are required to register on this third registration day will do so without complaint and in the knowledge that in doing so they are discharging one of the first obligations and privileges of citizenship.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I, J. MELVILLE BROUGHTON, Governor of North Carolina, have signed and caused the Great Seal of the State to be affixed hereto, in the City of Raleigh, North Carolina, this the 20th day of January, 1942, and in the one hundred sixty-sixth year of our American Independence.

Local Lodge To Be Awarded Etchings Of Two Greatest Americans

North Wilkesboro Lodge No. 243 will join the 1500 other lodges of the Loyal Order of Moose in paying tribute to the memory of America's two greatest patriots — George Washington and Abraham Lincoln — by sponsoring the enrollment of a large class of candidates in their honor on February 17, 1942. Reproductions of the Stuart etching of Washington and the portrait of Abraham Lincoln, beautifully framed in one assembly, will be presented to the local lodge in recognition of its participation in this ceremony, by the Supreme Lodge of the Loyal Order of Moose in conjunction with the Membership Enrollment Department at Mooseheart, Illinois. According to Mr. Maurice Walsh, Governor of the Moose Lodge this patriotic class will be the largest group initiation held locally for the past five years.

This new membership campaign is a part of a series of patriotic drives inaugurated two years ago by the Moose Supreme Lodge. The first drive was called the "Patriotic Campaign," the second, the "Volunteer Campaign," and the third, the "All-Out" Campaign.

The Washington and Lincoln award will be presented to the lodge on the night of the initiation of the February class. The presentation of the etchings will follow the ritualistic exercises and be made a most impressive feature of the program. A supreme lodge officer, or representative, in the name of the Supreme Lodge, will present the framed etchings of Washington and Lincoln, followed by patriotic exercises, to include music and an inspirational address on Washington and Lincoln by a qualified speaker.

Marines Accenting Men 30 To 50 For Limited Service

A law has recently been passed which permits the Marine Corps to accent men over thirty and under fifty years of age for enlistment in the limited service (Marine Corps, reserve (Class IV)), for duty as guards at naval shore activities within the continental limits of the United States.

Any ex-service men between the ages of 30 and 50 years of age, married or single, who are interested in this branch of the service, should write or call in person at the U. S. Marine Corps Recruiting Station, Post Office Building, Winston-Salem, N. C.

The Navy has taken a prominent part in developing aviation, deep sea diving, and short methods of navigation.

British Retreat Toward Egypt

Further Soviet advances on three sectors in latest fighting were reported from the eastern front Wednesday but in Libya the axis counteroffensive swept past Derna and drove retreating British imperial forces toward the Egyptian border.

Reinforced German troops in Russia were putting up desperate resistance to Soviet advances on the northwest and west of Moscow and to the south in the Uk-

raine. Red soldiers reported that captured German orders disclosed the Nazis had been commanded to "stand or die" and that commanders surrendering positions would be shot on the spot.

Reds Near Dnieper
But, according to Soviet dispatches, the Russian winter offensive continued to roll westward northwest of the capital, west of Moscow in the direction of Smolensk and in the south, where Soviet cavalry was reported within 20 miles of the Dnieper River.
