Miss Marcella Pendley, of Purlear, has accepted a position in the Office of Yadkin Valley Motor company.



Skinny Ennis, A College Flop, Organizes Band With Hal Kemp

Skinny Ennis's career is an example of what can be done in the way of turning a hobby into a life work.

Skinny always loved music. During high school in his native Salisbury, N. C., he organized and conducted a school band and orchestra. The boys didn't make much money, but they had lots of fun, and Skinny was launched on his career as an entertainer, which has currently reached a new high point in his outstanding role in Republic's "Sleeping Gal," starring Judy Canova, now showing at the Liberty Theatre Thursday-Friday.

During 1925 and 1926 Ennis attended the University of North Carolina, and his roommate was a lad of similar musical inclinations named Hal Kemp. Hal organized an orchestra, and Skinny was the most important member of the personnel, playing the drums and singing. Another member of that band was John Scott Trotter, now maestro of the Scott Music Hall.

Skinny was taking a commercial course, but the Kemp orchestra seemed to interfere with his studies. The interference was pretty well made when the boys counted up and found they had grossed \$2500 in the first nine months of their operation. With that kind of money coming in, the boys were more interested in arrangements than they were in math and English, and before long their college careers were abandoned.

Skinny was with the Kemp band for thirteen years. They came to the west coast to make a picture with Bob Hope, and Hope suggested to Ennis that he form an orchestra of his own. Ennis took heed, and was booked in the Victor Huco in 1935. He was here for two years, appearing meanwhile with the Bob Hope Peppercorn show on radio.

AAA To Elect New Committeemen

Falls No. 1, which is comprised of all the Moravian Falls Township north of Moravian Creek over to Moravian Falls this to a point approximately on the corner of Wilkesboro and Grassy Mountain Townships.

District No. 14—Moravian Falls No. 2, which includes all of the farms that lie south of Moravian Falls toward Walker Grove community or Walnut Grove community.

District No. 15—Mulberry No. 1, which is composed of all the northern section of Mulberry Township, down to a line across approximately two miles north of Mulberry school.

District No. 16—Mulberry No. 2, which is composed of all of Mulberry Township that lies west of highway No. 13 to Mulberry No. 1.

District No. 17—Mulberry No. 3, which is comprised of the territory between Highway No. 13 and Mulberry Creek.

District No. 18 is Mulberry No. 4, which is composed of the Hay Meadows community, or that portion that lies east of Mulberry creek up to Mulberry No. 1.

District No. 19—New Castle Township No. 1, which is comprised of Clingman community, or all of the territory lying north of old Highway No. 60 over to Clingman and then directly west to the Yadkin county line.

District No. 20—New Castle No. 2, comprised of the northern end of New Castle Township.

District No. 21—North Wilkesboro Township.

District No. 22—Reddies River No. 1, which is composed of all the territory that lies west of Millers Creek and from Millers Creek north on Highway No. 14.

District No. 23—Reddies River No. 2, which is composed of all the territory that lies east and north of Highway No. 16 and No. 421 in Reddies River Township.

District No. 24—Reddies River No. 3, which includes all the territory that lies between Millers Creek on the west and Highway No. 421 on the east.

District No. 25, Rock Creek No. 1, which is composed of all the land west of Knottville to the Knottville-Mountain View Road, then Northwest on the Hay Meadow Road.

District No. 26 Rock Creek No. 2, which is composed of all the territory on the northeast of the township that lies north and east of Mountain View-Roaring

River Road to a county road that leads over to Roaring River.

District No. 27, Rock Creek No. 2, which is composed of all the southeast corner of Rock Creek Township.

District No. 28, Somers Township.

District No. 29, Stanton Township.

District No. 30, Traphill No. 1, which is composed of all the territory in Traphill Township that lies west of Little Sandy Creek and Roaring River.

District No. 31—Traphill No. 2, which runs from Little Sandy Creek and Roaring River on the west over to the Doughton-Austin Elkin Road.

District No. 32, Union No. 1, which is composed of the middle fork community located in the north and west section of Union Township.

District No. 34, Union No. 2, which is composed of the North Fork or Vannoy Section that lies in the northeast corner.

District No. 35, Union No. 3, which is composed of from Whittington School south to the Stanton and Reddies River line.

District No. 36, Walnut Grove No. 1, which is comprised of the Springfield-Dehart Section that lies west of Carter's Mountain.

District No. 37, Walnut Grove No. 2, which is comprised of all the territory east of Carter's Mountain, composed of Abshers and Dockery Settlement.

District No. 38, Wilkesboro No. 1, which is all the territory that lies to the west of the east fork of Cub Creek.

District No. 39, Wilkesboro No. 2, which is all the territory that lies east of Cub Creek.

Places of voting for the purpose of electing community committeemen and delegates to the county convention will be announced at a later date.
