To grow a good garden, the soil should be fertile, well drained, one tube; North Wilkesborn should warm up quickly in the Grocery Con two tires, two spring, and should not bake after tubes; Walter Marion Marrison, a hard rain. If necessary select different parts of the farm where certain vegetables will grow the best.

Well rotted manure or sweepings from the poultry house are good fertilizers. Complete fertilizers may be used and the kind most commonly used is a 5-7-5, mixture.
