

### Many Eligible Applicants Will Not Get Tires

It is impossible to supply tires and tubes to every eligible applicant. Each board has on file approximately ten times as many applications as the county tire and tube quota will take care of. There will be many eligible persons applying who will not receive certificates to buy tires or tubes, either new or recapped. It is the duty of the Rationing Board to consider such applications carefully and issue certificates to the limit of the quota, not to the person who shows the greatest need for tires, but to the person whose vehicle is doing the work most essential to the welfare of the community and country.

Following are two lists of classifications, under one of which a vehicle must come if it is to be eligible for tires or tubes.

#### LIST A New Tires

The following vehicles shall be eligible for tires or tubes to the extent, and only to the extent, provided by chapter IV of the War Rationing Regulations:

- (a) A vehicle which is operated by a physician, surgeon, visiting nurse, or a farm veterinary, and which is used principally for professional services;
- (b) A vehicle which is operated by a regularly practicing midwife;

of any religious faith and which is used principally in and necessary to the performance of his religious duties;

- (c) An ambulance;
- (d) A vehicle used exclusively for one or more of the following purposes:
  - (1) To maintain fire-fighting services;
  - (2) To maintain necessary public police services;
  - (3) To enforce such laws as relate specifically to the protection of public health and safety;
  - (4) To maintain garbage disposal and other sanitation services;
  - (5) To maintain mail services;

(e) A vehicle with a capacity of 10 or more passengers operated exclusively for one or more of the following purposes:

- (1) Transportation of passengers as part of the services rendered to the public by a regular transportation system;
- (2) Transportation of students and teachers to or from school;
- (3) Transportation of employees to or from any industrial or extractive establishment, power generation or transmission facilities, transportation or communication facilities, construction projects, or farm, except when public transportation facilities are readily available;
- (4) A truck operated exclusively for one or more of the purposes stated in the preceding sections or for one or more of the following purposes:
  - (1) Transportation of ice and fuel;
  - (2) Transportation of materials and equipment for construction or for mechanical, structural, or highway maintenance or repair;
  - (3) Transportation by any common carrier;
  - (4) Transportation of waste and scrap materials;
  - (5) Transportation of scrap and waste materials;
  - (6) Transportation of raw materials, semifinished goods, and finished products, including farm products and food; Provided, that no certificate shall be issued under this paragraph for a tire or tube to be mounted on a truck used for transportation of commodities to the ultimate consumer for personal, family or household use.
  - (7) Farm tractors or other farm implements other than automobiles and trucks, for the operation of which rubber tires or tubes are essential;
  - (8) Industrial, mining, and construction equipment, other than automobiles or trucks, for the operation of which rubber tires or tubes are essential.

#### LIST B Recapped

The following vehicles shall be eligible for tires to the extent and only to the extent provided by chapter V of the War Rationing Regulations:

- (a) A passenger automobile used principally to provide one or more of the following transportation services:
  - (1) Licensed jitney, taxi or similar transportation service to the general public;
  - (2) Transportation of persons to enable them to render construction or mechanical, structural, or highway repair and maintenance services;
  - (3) Transportation of executives, engineers, technicians, and workers to and from, or within, any of the following as are essential to the war effort: Power generation or transmission facilities, or agricultural, extractive, industrial, military, or naval establishments;
  - (4) Transportation on official business of Federal, State or local government employees engaged in the performance of government functions essential to the public health, safety, or the war effort;
  - (5) Transportation of produce and supplies to and from the farm if an applicant operating such a farm does not own or possess a truck or other practicable means of transportation;
  - (6) Transportation of traveling salesmen who are engaged in the sale of farm, extractive, or industrial equipment, foods, or medical supplies, the distribution of which is essential to the war effort;
  - (7) Transportation of newspapers for wholesale delivery; Provided, That a passenger automobile to be eligible under this paragraph must be used exclusively for one or more of the purposes in this subsection (a);
- (b) Trucks used for any important purpose not included in List A

Passenger cars coming under List A are eligible for new tires and tubes only. Other vehicles coming under List A are eligible for new tires and tubes, if the applicant cannot produce tires which will stand recapping.

All vehicles coming under List B are eligible for recapped tires, or recapping service only, except such vehicles as wear obsolete type tires. Vehicles coming under List B are eligible for new tubes.

Any vehicle under List A or List B, which will wear obsolete type tires, is eligible for new tires of an obsolete size.

There are limitations to each of these classifications, which make the eligible group considerably smaller than it may appear to be.

#### QUESTIONS Answered By State College

QUESTION: What is an economical way of preserving eggs at home?

ANSWER: C. F. Parrish, Extension Poultryman, says the water glass method has proven the most popular method for most farm families. Especially at this season of the year when eggs are plentiful and prices low should eggs be preserved for future use when prices are higher. Detailed instructions for the water glass method are contained in a publication which may be secured from farm and home agents or from the poultry department State College, Raleigh, N. C.

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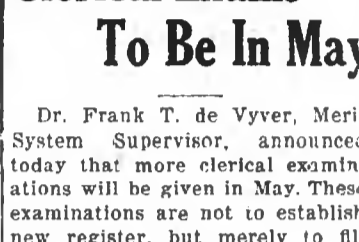
